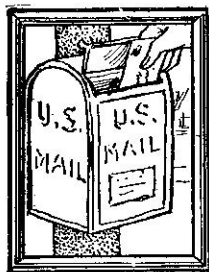
Reunion Headquarters will be at the Southern Hotel.
