GENERAL HINES REPLIES to RAINBOW RESOLUTIONS

Editor's Note: The National Reunion of Rainbow Division Veterans, held at Chicago last July, passed several Resolutions which were given space in the September issue of this magazine. Printed copies of these Resolutions were mailed to the President of the United States, and to each member of Congress. The following letter from General Hines, under date of August 24th, 1933, is published without comment on our part, but we invite your reactions that they may be carried in future issues.

There has been forwarded to the Veterans' Administration for consideration the Resolutions passed by the Fifteenth Annual Reunion of Rainbow Division Veterans.

You urge the President of the United States to "make as liberal as practicable the compensation and disability allowances of those whose disability is connected with the service of our country at the time when world security hung in the balance."

Under the program now in effect the national obligation to veterans may be summarized briefly as follows, bearing in mind that the rates were established taking into consideration the ability of the Government to meet the financial obligation involved:

1. To pay the most liberal rates of pension and to furnish medical, hospital, and domiciliary care to veterans disabled, and to grant pensions to the dependents of veterans who die, as a result of injury or disease incurred in or aggravated in the military or naval service in time of war;
2. To grant pensions and to furnish medical, hospital, and domiciliary care to veterans disabled, and to grant pensions to the dependents of deceased veterans who died, as a result of injury or disease incurred or aggravated in the military or naval service in peace-time;
3. To grant pensions to war veterans permanently and totally disabled and in need and to furnish medical, hospital and domiciliary care to permanently disabled war veterans, including those suffering from tuberculosis and neuropsychiatric ailments incapacitated from earning a living and who have no adequate means of support, and, except as to rates, to continue a pre-existing provision for pensions to widows and children of deceased Spanish-American War veterans who have died, as a result of injury or disease not connected with the military or naval service.

The foregoing is the policy, certain exceptions having been provided by the Congress, which exceptions are easily determined by reference to the present law and regulations.

You will be interested to know that a comparison of the rates of pensions payable in accordance with the terms of Veterans Regulation No. 1 (a), promulgated by the President on June 6, 1933, indicates that such rates for World War

veterans with disabilities incurred directly in line of duty, will be approximately 10% less than the rates of compensation authorized prior to the enactment of Public No. 2. By the same Regulation many veterans of the Spanish-American War, whose disabilities were incurred in service, will receive higher rates than those authorized under the prior regulations. You also propose that in rating disabilities for emergency officers the term "causative factor" should be liberalized. There is now in progress a study of the effects of Public No. 2, and the Regulations promulgated by the President pursuant thereto with the view of modification of any Regulations found necessary to assure equitable dispensation of benefits to veterans. In considering the application of the Regulations in the review of claims of emergency officers, your recommendation on this subject will be given earnest consideration.

Any consideration of the causes and effects of the new policy governing veterans' relief as established by the enactment of Public No. 2, 73rd Congress, "An Act to Maintain the Credit of the United States Government" and the Presidential Regulations promulgated thereunder requires that it be taken into account that it was necessary, in the opinion of the President, the Congress, and those officials otherwise responsible for the financial stability of the Government to effect economies in expenditures on account of veterans' relief and to provide a more uniform national policy for granting such relief. It must also be taken into account that expenditures on account of veterans' relief are fixed charges which have been mounting year by year since the World War and unless the policy was changed, such expenditures would continue to increase for many years to come. The President was of the opinion, as evidenced by his program, that certain unusual expenditures were justified as a temporary means of aiding national recovery, but that the fixed charges of the Government had to be reduced if the national credit was to be maintained. The maintenance of the national credit is essential to providing relief to veterans even to a minimum extent.

The required economies could not be effected without reducing the monetary benefits payable in many cases, and in others, discontinuing benefits entirely. It is realized that some of those persons adversely affected will feel that such action does not afford justice to them. However, any plan which would have the effect of discontinuing and curtailing benefits would naturally cause many of those adversely affected to feel that they were treated unjustly. Until we have had more experience in applying the provisions of the new regulations it is not possible to say whether or not certain classes which were adversely affected were not expected to be so affected or whether groups of veterans or dependents of veterans would be removed from the rolls which it was not contemplated would be removed from the rolls. * * *

* * * Pending the review of all claims required by Public No. 2, and the adjudication of rights thereunder, it is suggested that the members of the group you represent await action under the present Regulations before reaching definite conclusions or formulating opinions regarding the entire program.

The copy of the resolutions received from the President will be retained in the legislative files of the Veterans' Administration for future consideration.
