In celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the entrance of the Rainbow Division into the trenches of France in the Luneville Sector on Washington's Birthday 1918, the Association will conduct the Annual Broadcast from Washington, D. C.

The National Broadcasting Co. has graciously offered us its facilities for fifteen minutes on February twenty-second from 7:30 to 7:45 P.M. Eastern War Time.

Speakers on the program will be Colonel William J. Donovan, C.M., head of the Office of Strategic Services, and Congressman James Fay, O.P.H., both Rainbow Veterans.

A communication from General Douglas MacArthur is expected and if received will be read during the program.

Please contact local stations of the National Broadcasting Co. and consult your newspapers for announcements of the program as wartime exigencies may necessitate alteration of the schedule.

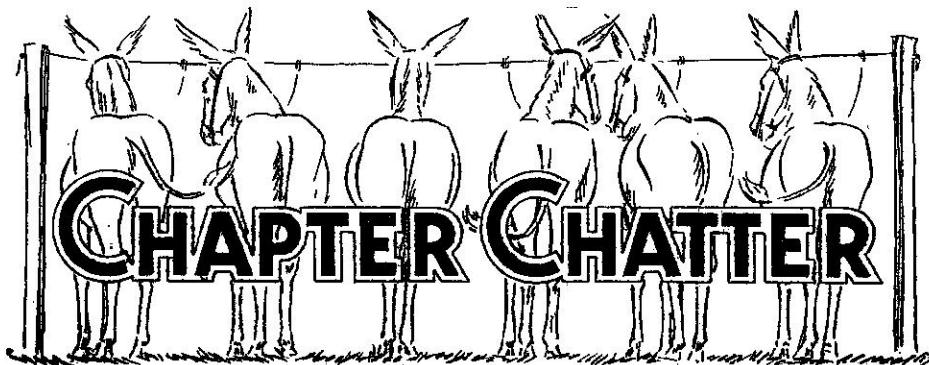


CAPTAIN LAWRENCE WOOD

Captain Larry Wood has sent in some very interesting details of his work in North Africa, where he has been serving in the motor transport division of the Ordnance Department. Larry writes: "... the cold has been intense, much colder in ——— than in ———. I was sleeping in the back of a truck on a folded blanket ... Water was scarce, only two quarts per day per man ... got so filthy I had to use half of mine for bathing ... have been on leave to ———, where I stayed at a good hotel and had plenty of hot baths and good food ... had a chance to get a cushy job in ——— but passed it up to stay with my men ... American cigarettes cost 80 cents per pack ..."

Larry has written to Frances, giving the names of the men in his detachment, and thinks it would be swell if some of you Rainbowers would send some cigarettes to these lads. INDIANA—The Indiana State Chapter of Indianapolis celebrated the 25th anniversary of the Rainbow Division landing in France by the completion and opening of the "Rainbow Room" in the main shrine building of the Indiana World War Memorial.

Several years ago the World War Memorial Commission of Indiana set aside this room for the Rainbow Division Veterans as a permanent memorial to the Rainbow dead and to house such souvenirs and relics of the Division as might be available. Since that time the efforts of the Indiana State Chapter have been toward the proper completion of this task. Under the supervision of Mr. Robert Hollingsworth, a prominent Indianapolis artist, the room has now been completed and opened to the public.

As a fitting ceremony for the opening of this room, Indiana State Chapter held open house for the public for a three-day period. A banquet was held at the Claypool Hotel to start the celebration, with Rainbowers from all over the State in attendance. Among the prominent speakers of the evening were Colonel Frank Hensley, Director of the Indiana World War Memorial Commission; Hon. Charles Jewett, former Mayor of Indianapolis, and General Robert Tyndall, former Colonel of the 150th F.A.

Rainbow men were in attendance at all

times in the Rainbow Room during the three days of open house and received the many guests who came in from all parts of the country.

Formal dedication ceremonies were held on Saturday afternoon, October 31. The Rev. R. A. Bishop Kirchoffer of Indianapolis gave the dedicatory prayer and among the speakers for the occasion were the following Rainbow men: former National Commander of Rainbow Division Veterans, Dan I. Glossbrenner; General Robert H. Tyndall and Sidney S. Miller.

Indiana is proud of this Room and invites all Rainbowers and their friends to inspect it when the opportunity presents. We are sure you will find it will meet with the approval of all as a beautiful memorial to all Rainbow men. Many battle flags and other relics of the Division are already housed here and on display and others are coming in rapidly. A special Rainbow Register has been provided in the room for Rainbowers only, so do not fail to see that you are registered in this book while here.

PENNSYLVANIA—This being General Douglas MacArthur Year and the 25th anniversary of Rainbow, we feel the following data should be of great interest to all true Rainbowers:

Permanent Honorary President, Rainbow Division Veterans.

1880—Born January 26, Little Rock Barracks, Arkansas.

1903—Graduated from West Point, Second Lieutenant of Engineers.

1917-18—Commander of the famous Rainbow Division.

1919—Appointed Superintendent of West Point.

1925—Named youngest active Major General in the U. S. Army.

1930—Appointed Chief of Staff by President Hoover. At the age of 50, General MacArthur was the youngest living "Four Star" General, a rank previously held only by Grant, Sherman, Sheridan, Pershing, Bliss, March and Summerall.

1935—Made "Field Marshal of the Philippines" by Filipino President Quezon; officially confirmed in 1936.

1941—Appointed by President Roosevelt to be Commanding General of all the U. S. Armed Forces in the Far East—Lieutenant General, U.S.A.

1942—Again raised to the full rank of General, in tribute to his heroic defense of the Bataan Peninsula.

1942—March 17, arrived in Australia as Supreme Commander of United Nations Forces in Southwestern Pacific.

Since March 17, 1942, the world knows full well where General MacArthur is and what he is doing. Yes, for you and for me.

To the veterans of the 165th, Allie wasn't only a comrade and friend but he typified the spirit of the Fighting 69th and as such represented our ideals of a Rainbowier.

Homage was paid to him as he lay in state in the 69th Armory by all Rainbowers, and those who were part of the funeral cortege were exceedingly proud to escort his remains up Fifth Avenue on which he had on various occasions trod so proudly at the head of his men of the 165th Inf., Rainbow Division.

Father Duffy Chapter meetings during the months of December and January have been fairly well attended and with refreshments that are served at each meeting the members are afforded the opportunity of fraternizing with their buddies more so than ever before. The members' dues have come in very well and at the rate we have been going, our quota for this year should be reached. If it were not for the fact that the treasurer of the chapter has some Scotch in him, our paid-up members' standing of the chapters would be much higher than is now shown. The committee for the Annual Ball and Reunion of the New York Chapters to be held at the Lost Battalion Hall on April 10, 1943, are busy under the chairmanship of Oliver Atkinson. Ticket books for \$500 in War Bonds are to be sent to all members and other Rainbowers on the mailing list. A share of the proceeds from the donation ticket books and sale of tickets will again go towards the Canteen Fund for the 165th Infantry Regiment now in active service for our country. Up to the present time the New York Chapter's contribution to this canteen fund is approximately \$1,000. It is felt that the knowledge of the purpose of this ball will be an incentive for every Rainbowier to dispose of as many books and tickets as is possible. This is the least that we can do for those who are giving their all to make our mode of living possible in the future.

The Honor Roll of the Rainbow Division Veterans of Father Duffy's Chapter who are now serving their country in World War II will be unveiled in the Father Duffy Room on February 12. The honor roll will contain names of approximately 100 Veterans

who are now back in service, of which two will have a gold star after their names.

On February 11 the Machine Gun Company will hold a dinner at the Hotel Martinique and from all indications it should be a great success. This dinner will be different from any that has ever been held inasmuch as the serving will be done by the old cocks of the company and the food will be a regular Army stew eaten out of mess kits. Now that it is difficult to purchase meat the boys might be tickled to death to once more go to work on a good Army stew.
