THE BEGINNINGS OF A RAINBOW

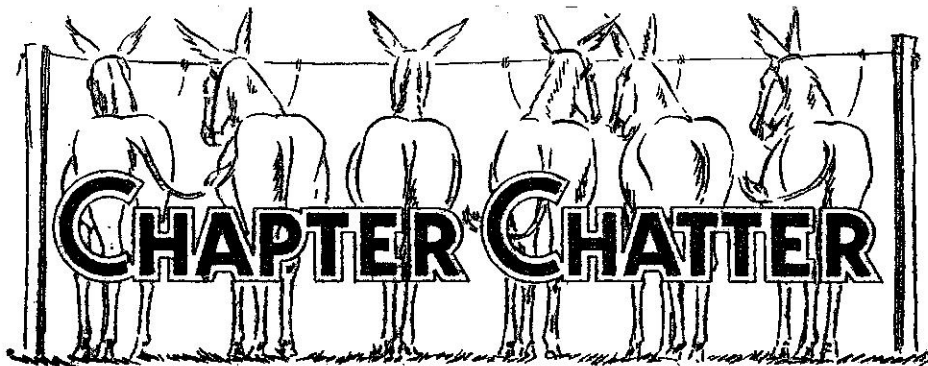
Since the last Reveille went to press the events of the war have taken a turn offering the greatest encouragement. Most notable from the American viewpoint was the opening of a second front in Africa by a large American force. This new A.E.F., operating in conjunction with the British (and French troops regained as allies), promises to gain complete control of North Africa when Rommel's forces are finally crushed between the two great armies between which he is now placed. With the destruction of Axis armies in Africa it becomes possible to build up immense Allied bases there; to regain use of Mediterranean routes; to completely knock out Italy as an enemy factor, and to freeze enormous Axis armies in south and south-eastern Europe while the Russians revive

their offensive power against Hitler's weakened forces. The crucial battles to ensure these ends have not yet been fought, the issues of these battles can by no means be foretold with assurance. But to our sturdy confidence in the final outcome may now be added the reasonable hope that the final phase of the conflict in Europe and the Near East has been reached. How much time will be required to achieve final victory in that theater of war, how many heart-breaking setbacks will be encountered in its accomplishment, we know not. But it is crystal clear that for Hitler's dream of power the sands of time are fast running out. Meanwhile, in the Pacific, American naval victories have offset the disastrous blow struck at Pearl Harbor; the tide seems to have turned against the Japs in the Solomons, while General MacArthur has gone far in his campaign to eliminate the Japs from their control of New Guinea bases. The Chinese have reported important victories in south China; and as this is written the British have just made a deep advance into Burma, hinting at a move to regain control of this crucial strategic link between China and India. On the home front, incredible strides have been taken toward the transformation of our peacetime industry and economy into one vast military machine, embracing all of our resources and all of our manpower and womanpower. The results have been beyond our expectation, but not beyond our requirements; and on the home front, too, the crucial battles remain to be fought and won. All in all, we enter the New Year bolstered by encouraging news, but possessing the grim knowledge that final victory lies beyond many distant and bloody battlefields.

ALABAMA—Armistice Day passed without its usual gaieties. Parades, long lines of soldiers, flags and Army fighting equipment were absent from the streets. Instead, there was a cessation of all activities and men, women and children bowed their heads in one minute of silent tribute to the men who gave their lives in 1917-1942 for the cause of democracy.

Many Rainbowers participated in the memorial exercises and decoration of the graves of World War I and II heroes, sponsored by the Jefferson County Council of the American Legion.

Albert Hoyt of Cleveland, National President, had his wings clipped en route to Birmingham. His plane was grounded in Atlanta, Ga., and to continue his journey he was compelled to hire a taxi to carry him to the Alabama state line and there he was met by the Alabama State Highway Patrol, which escorted him to Birmingham at the speed of 70 miles an hour, arriving at the Bankhead Hotel in time for the Mortimer H. Jordan Chapter's traditional Armistice Day banquet. He was serenaded by the American Legion Drum and Bugle Corps. Better luck next time you make a trip, Al.

At the banquet, Albert Hoyt was the principal speaker. Other speakers included Capt. Harold B. Rodier of Washington, D. C., editor of *The Reveille*; W. B. Dandridge of Mobile,

state president; B. J. O'Hara, president of the Tuscaloosa Chapter; A. A. Holsemback of Anniston, past state president; E. W. Pritchett of Montgomery, past state president; Ted Hagen, commander of the Gorgas Post, American Legion; Mrs. Gaines Burnett, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary, and Mrs. Evelyn Dandridge of Mobile, national first vice-president of the Ladies' Auxiliary.

Jimmy Thigpen, president of the chapter, presided. Dr. Armour, general chairman, acted as toastmaster.

Turkey was served with all its seasonal trimmings and chapters throughout the state were well represented.

By acclamation, Joe Adams has been elected to serve out the unexpired term of H. S. Foster as secretary-treasurer of the Mortimer H. Jordan Chapter.

With B. J. O'Hara, president, presiding, the William M. Peters Chapter of Tuscaloosa held its regular monthly meeting in its clubrooms over Baker's Restaurant.

After considerable discussion, pertaining to the Alabama War Chest appeal, a motion was made and adopted to contribute \$10 to this worthy cause.

President O'Hara, in his campaign for membership, urged all members to canvass the city and surrounding territory for Rain-bowers and to bring in delinquent dues.

Our "MacArthur '42 Club" is still going strong. The boys are still paying in their 42c each week and Uncle Sam is still delivering War Bonds. Jack Wilson, treasurer of the fund, supplied a most interesting report on the activities of this club at our November meeting. Seems that while every member signed up for the 42c per week, most of them have been pouring in many times that amount.

For the first time since we came home from Germany, everyone in California realized this year that Armistice Day surely was just that. So, instead of the big parade through the Los Angeles downtown area, this year the former soldiers and sailors put on a series of four smaller parades, timed for different hours, each about ten blocks in length, and winding up at Victory House—that Treasury Department War Bond "spot" in the heart of town—where a continuous program of Bond selling went on from early morning until late at night. The committee which annually represents all veteran groups in planning the celebration of Armistice Day sponsored a campaign among the Posts and Chapters to see who could sell the most Bonds. The prize was the privilege of naming a CalShip Liberty cargo vessel. Won by Beverly Hills Chapter of the D.A.V., those boys promptly named the vessel the Frank J. Irwin in honor of a 27th Division D.S.C. man known and loved by every combat veteran in California, who departed this life a few months ago.

Los Angeles Chapter and our Auxiliary have just agreed to hold no Christmas party this year. Instead, a definite program to see that each Rainbow or son of a Rainbow now in service be properly remembered on December 25, is to be undertaken. Your correspondent does not have a list of these uniformed Rainbows available, but from memory we can list a few: Frank Bughman and Harry Hardy (D-149th F.A.) are back in the Army, the latter coming back from Pearl Harbor to re-enlist with a camouflage outfit. In the same outfit is "Bud" O'Neill, son of our Past President "Tip"
