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A NEW RAINBOW DIVISION

The subject of the re-establishment of a Rainbow Division will not die. Your Editor was at a recent meeting of the Birmingham Chapter when it was discussed and the opinion was virtually unanimous that this war can use a Rainbow Division to advantage.

It is becoming clearer that the weighty and genuine objections to a re-formation of a Rainbow Division become pale and shadowy when confronted with the overpowering advantages to be thereby gained.

Let us consider what these advantages would be. In the first place, it is manifestly evident that a new Rainbow Division would be really new; the old regiments and other units are now (it is understood) scattered from one end of the world to the other. Nothing is less likely than that they would be re-

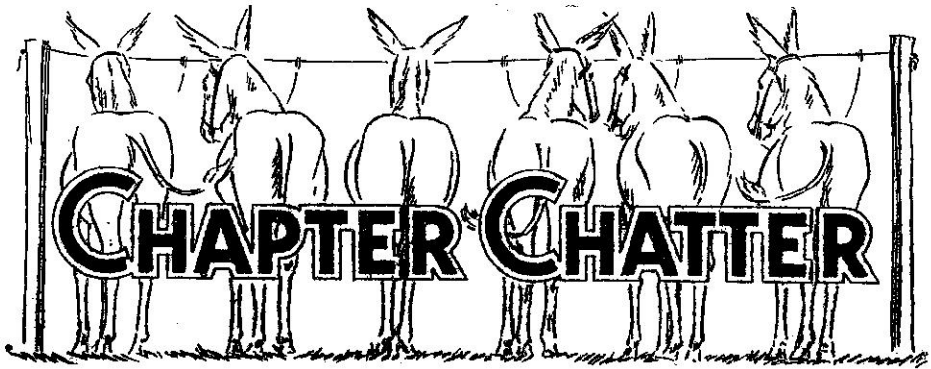
assembled to form a new 42nd Division. It would necessarily be made up, then, from scratch. This being so, wherein would it differ from any other newly activated division, save that it carried the number "42" and the name "Rainbow"? Well, to begin with, such a division would beyond question include among its personnel a sufficient number of officers and men who served with the original Rainbow to give it real Rainbow "flavor." There are sufficient Rainbows already in the service and available in this country to accomplish this end. Next, it would be plainly logical to transfer to such a division a considerable number of the sons of Rainbow veterans to accomplish the obvious spiritual advantages of such a course. And finally, such a division would inherit the divisional citations, battle flags, and, above all, its glorious traditions. Who can doubt that with such a heritage a new Rainbow would spring to life as an organization with an inescapable and enormously important esprit de corps which would multiply its every effort? Certainly no veteran of the old Rainbow Division can have any such doubt. We saw replacement troops enter the Division, some of whom were virtually raw recruits, become instantly and magically inculcated with the spirit of the Division and in their first engagement fight like veterans. The spirit of an organization such as ours is as contagious as it is deathless. Endowed with the name and traditions of Rainbow; supplied with enough of its former members to implant and inculcate this spirit, nothing could be more certain than that the newly activated Rainbow would enter upon its service filled with a flaming spirit and a determination to uphold and add glory to the traditions of their historic organization.

Reputedly Napoleon once said, "In an army, the spiritual is to the physical as ten is to one." Certainly this conception is an accepted doctrine of modern armies. An army or a division which enters battle endowed with enthusiasm, pride and confidence is certainly going to be superior in effectiveness to one which lacks these qualities. To overlook the advantage to be gained by overlocking one of our new divisions with the spirit which is Rainbow would be to fail to take advantage of an important military asset.

Your Editor cannot conceive that our Army is going to overlook such an asset. The disadvantages pale into insignificance beside the consideration of morale. It should not be forgotten that the establishment of a new Rainbow would set up rivalries which might be even more important in their spiritual implications than in the Rainbow Division itself. In the last war Rainbow gave the other Divisions something to "shoot against." The effect of this rivalry was of great importance. It can be so again.

Rainbows throughout the nation must surely fervently hope that the glorious traditions of our Division be resurrected from the musty pages of history and again become a living and vital part of America's fighting armies.
