

It had a great cast of characters: it had eleven of eighteen national officers in attendance; it had many Rainbowers who had never attended a Rainbow Reunion of any type before; it had many more who had never attended a Mid-Year Meeting; it had an ardent Rainbower who had never served in Rainbow: and it had one of the most inspiring moments of any recent Mid-Year Meeting, the massing of Rainbow faithful at the MacArthur Memorial in Norfolk for a Memorial Service to Rainbow veterans who have Passed Over the Rainbow. That ceremony must live in the memory of those present as one of the most beautiful and impressive moments that ever happened at any Rainbow gathering.

It had a great background: situated on a spit of land protruding into Chesapeake Bay, from the Chamberlin Hotel one could view at arms length the moat and ramparts of historic Fort Monroe, once bristling with massive coast artillery that guarded the approaches to these strategic waters; within it's walls one can see the cell occupied for six years by Jefferson Davis following the Civil war, although he was never formally charged; and if you closed your eyes just a bit, you could see the ironclads Merrimac and Monitor dueling to the death in those very waters, or hear the thunder of guns arising from the last major engagement of the Civil War just to the west at Sailor's Creek.

If any proof were needed, the 1983 Mid-Year Meeting proved that it pays to move the meeting around the country to involve more members just as it does to move the Annual Reunion from city to city. And those "snow-birds" who eschewed the Virginia Mid-Year to avoid freezing winds and snow will have to find another excuse. With no trace of snow on the ground, the weather, cloudy and cool on Friday, turned bright and sunny on Saturday as a perfect setting for the trip to the MacArthur Memorial.

In Memoriam



P.N.P. Barney Sullivan

Past National President Bernard "Barney" J. Sullivan, of Gulfport, Florida, passed Over the Rainbow at the Bay Pines Veterans Hospital on Sunday, March 20, 1983. Barney was elected President of RDVA in 1970 at the 52nd Rainbow Reunion in Philadelphia, PA.

Barney was a movie stunt man in the 1920's, and perfected the art of crashing cars into walls and buildings. He also performed more than 300 delayed parachute jumps before he gave up performing stunts in 1936.

In addition to being a Past National President of RDVA, he was also past secretary-treasurer of the Florida Rainbow Association, a member of the American Legion from its founding, one of the founders of the Holy Name Catholic Church of Gulfport and a member of the Gulf Port Rotary Club.

Survivors include his wife Helen, a stepdaughter Margaret Spiers, West Palm Beach, and several nieces and nephews.

The Man Who Adopted Rainbow

It's easy for those of us who served in Rainbow during the two World Wars to have a deep affinity for the 42nd Division, but D. Harvey Phillips of Bradford, PA, who never served in Rainbow or the army, is devoted to Rainbow for quite another reason. On February 7, 1983, he wrote to Chris Reilly:

"I personally knew General Henri Gouraud, Commander of the French Fourth Army, under whose overall command the Rainbow Division served. I had met him in Paris in 1925 at his headquarters when he was Military Governor of Paris. Previously I had met him at the Chapel at Valley Forge when he Aide-de-Camp, Philippe his DeVibraye, came to attend a service honoring Generals Washington and LaFayette. He and his aide crossed from France in 1923 on the same ship as my mother and a young lady from France, all sitting at the same table. His aide, Count DeVibraye, fell quite in love with the young lady traveling with my mother. Upon their invitation, following the 5th Reunion of the Rainbow Division in Indianapolis, which they were coming as guests of honor to attend, they agreed to come to Bradford for a few days visit as guests of my mother and to stay at our house. All was suddenly terminated by the death of President Harding, and they wired from Indianapolis they had to go immediately to Washington to represent the French Government at the funeral.

"Two years later, 1925, I had a long visit with General Gouraud in Paris. For these reasons, I have always felt very close to the Rainbow Division, and I know our Pennsylvania 28th National Guard, a unit from Bradford, also served under his command. It would be nice to meet with some of your men personally, and recount my memories of General Gouraud and his Count DeVibraye. If so, would I be welcome, and have a room available at the Chamberlin where we visited years ago?"

Mrs. Irene Reilly, just two weeks after the passing of her husband, answered Mr. Phillips letter on February 14. Without mentioning her husband's death, she wrote in part:

"Your letter detailing your friendship with the late General Henri Gouraud and the enclosures made fascinating reading and would to anyone interested in World War I and its aftermath, but especially to all Rainbowers.

"If your business schedule permits you to join us on that day, we shall be honored to welcome you."

And join us he did. We only hope this 81year-old gentleman enjoyed the Mid Year Reunion as much as we did having him with us.

Mid Year Report

In his "State of Rainbow" report to the Executive Committee at the Mid Year Meeting, President Evanoff laid the groundwork for some pertinent issues that will be placed on the agenda for resolution at the Annual Reunion in Dallas. He said:

"I would like to think that most of you are well aware of my sentiments as to the future direction in which Rainbow should be heading. All of the National Officers, including PNP's and Executive Committeemen were in receipt of my letters of August 20 and October 29, 1982, which pretty much defined my plans.

"As you recall I appointed a Task Force consisting of the five Regional Vice Presidents with Bill Keithan as Chairman. Bill is a very busy individual, and his job requires him to be on the road a great deal, but he has accomplished much in the two areas of his responsibility; the Task Force and the Archives.

"The old adage still applies - if you want something done, give it to a busy man. Bill has organized both of these large assignments and has put the ball back in our court, by sending out questionnaires to 125 officers, PNPs and Committeemen. Hopefully, you all have taken the necessary time to study both and have made your contribution. Bill will report to you on the progress he is making.

"I am making a recommendation that we create a new position - that of President Elect. Hopefully this body will give this

recommendation due consideration and be in position to present it to the Constitution and By-Laws Committee at Dallas. I am of the opinion that this action is required immediately if we expect to establish some immediate continuity in leadership. This proposal will buy some time for the Task Force and permit them the necessary time to develop a complete plan for the future of Rainbow."

Bill Keithan later reported that he had mailed out over 120 questionnaires on both issues and had received only twenty-five replies. He did say, however, that some definite trends were beginning to develop. (1) The rapid turnover of leadership seemed to be uppermost in many minds, preventing the newly elected president from creating programs that could be carried out during his tenure. To this end, sentiment leaned toward creating a system of chairs that the future president would move through before assuming the position. This is nothing new; The Rainbow Auxiliary has this system and it works. Many other organizations have the same system.

(2) Concern was expressed in several replies that the by laws do not spell out the duties of vice presidents; this body of proven Rainbowers would be a vital force in the Association if given definite missions to perform. (3) The Executive Committee has grown too large and is primarily an honorary position in the minds of many of those submitting replies; several recommended reduction in size and more careful selection of nominees to

insure making this body relevant and useful to the president.

And (4), lack of appreciation shown to loyal Rainbowers who carry out their jobs quitely and efficiently, and largely without acknowledgement by the Membership.

Bill Keithan will have a more comprehensive report to present to the National Association at Dallas. He requests that everyone return their replies to him as soon as possible.

P.N.P. Charles Sayers, Liaison Officer, suggested that any bids for future Reunions should be placed in the hands of the Liaison Officer prior to the meeting of the Time and Place Committee at Reunions in order that the Committee may have time to study the bid.

P.N.P. Howard G. Smith proposed a Resolution to the White House in support of President Reagan's effort to meet USSR armament. The proposal was accepted for formal presentation to the membership at Dallas.

The question of establishing a Life Membership for Rainbow, as so many other veterans organizations have, was broached again. The President asked for any Rainbowers who have expertise in this field to submit proposals to the Task Force for consideration at Dallas.

In closing the meeting, President Evanoff saw that one of the obstacles we will be faced with in instituting some of these proposed changes will be finances. "It will behoove us," he said, "to develop fund-raising projects in order to support our future plans."

Dallas: 64th or 65th?

There seems to be some difference of opinion as to whether the Dallas Reunion will be the 64th or the 65th.

Writes "Slim" Sutherland, Rainbow Historian, "From time to time over the years, Reunion Chairmen have 'goofed' in numbering an annual Reunion. The latest example is that of the 1982 Reunion held last July in Oklahoma; the official program and the Minutes refer to that gathering as the '64th Annual Reunion' of our Association.

"Back in March of 1919, in Germany, our Association was born during a Constitutional Convention where each man present was there under orders to form an Association. Upon completion of their work, and included as a requirement, was a provision that an annual National Reunion be held; the first one was specified to be held in Birmingham, Alabama, in July of 1920.

"Including the 1982 Reunion in Tulsa, we have subsequently held exactly 63 National Reunions. The one scheduled for Dallas in July of 1983 will be the 64th."

The numbering of the Reunions is not something the Chairman does without some guidance. He doesn't wake up some morning and say, "I think I'll name this one the 95th Reunion." Or the 17th, or whatever. The Chairman is guided by a roster of past reunions, and the numbering of Reunions was settled 'way back in the beginning.


For example, if the Birmingham Reunion in 1920 was the First Reunion, as it's program and minutes proclaimed (see page 4, March '83 REVEILLE), how could the 1927 Reunion in Des Moines - seven years later - have been officially designated as the 9th Annual Reunion? Yet, there it is on the cover of the Official Minutes of the Reunion, and in the opening remarks of President Howard G. Smith, who said, "As President of the Rainbow Division Veterans, I call the 9th Annual Reunion to Order."

According to Slims calculations, the Des Moines Reunion should have been the 8th Reunion. UNLESS, between 1920 and 1927, it was decided that the organizational meeting in Germany in 1919 was indeed a reunion under the standard definition of the word: "A gathering of the members of a group."

Just when this re-numbering took place can only be determined by examining the Minutes of the 2nd through 8th National Reunions. It is simple to prove that since the 9th Reunion, all subsequent Reunions have been numbered in sequence with no breaks or duplications.

Slim, you have the Minutes of all those Reunions in your historical files. How about going through them and telling us what happened to the numbering of Reunions in those first eight years.

Pre-registration is encouraged. Please remit the fee of \$25.00 per person to Registrar Horace Rose, 9706 Forestridge Dr., Dallas, TX 75238, furnishing the full name and address of each person registering, and the service unit.

As many have asked, what about the weather? You were maybe expecting snow? But who cares about the weather when a bunch of Rainbowers get together? One person wrote (he's pre-registered) and asked if I could guarantee 80-degree weather. The obvious reply was no. I can promise though, if the weather follows a normal pattern for Dallas, it will be pleasantly warm.
