Ted Johnson performed magnificently (normal for Ted) in rendering "Rouge Bouquet" in his delivery of the champagne hour, followed by Taps. The mournful notes hung in the air as we soberly filed out.

The feature banquet on Saturday night with PNP Ted Johnson as M.C. Seated at the head table were Fr. and Shirley Forde, Auxiliary President-elect Grace and Red Cap John Walker, President-elect Ted Simonson and Pat Hughes, PNP Harold and Edna Melinek, President Pete Pettus and his lovely daughter, Joni, Auxiliary President Dorothy and Red Cap Joe Smith, PNP Ted Johnson, Brigadier General Joseph Taluto, Deputy Commander 42nd N.G. Mayor Giuliani and Coalition for Father Duffy Rededicate Memorial for WWI Hero in Times Square Ceremony

Civic Leaders Join Members of the Fighting 69th and Rainbow Division in Celebrating the 130th Anniversary of Legendary Chaplain's Birth

NEW YORK, May 2, 2001 – The Coalition for Father Duffy and Mayor Rudolph W. Giuliani today rededicated the Father Duffy Memorial in Times Square in a poignant ceremony marking the 130th anniversary of the beloved cleric's birth. A new historic marker designed by the New York City Parks Department was also unveiled near the bronze memorial statue of Lt. Col. Francis Patrick Duffy, an inspirational World War I hero who became a charismatic community leader in New York City in the years after the war.

Joining the Mayor at today's rededication ceremony were Joseph A. Healey, former Commanding Officer of the 69th Regiment, Commanding General of the Rainbow Division and Co-Chair of the Coalition for Father Duffy; William T. Kenny, Chair of the Memorial Foundation of the Rainbow Veteran's Association and Co-Chair of the Coalition for Father Duffy; Henry J. Stern, the New York City Parks Commissioner; and Rev. Peter M. Colapietro, Pas-

tor of Holy Cross Church. The 69th Infantry Battalion Color Guard, Regimental Piper Joseph Brady, and the New York City Police Department Band also attended the rededication ceremony.

"Today we reaffirm our respect for this great American hero, a man who profoundly touched the lives of thousands of people, both here in New York and on the bloody battlefields of France," said General Healey. "Father Duffy's military and civic heroism inspired a generation, and continue to inspire us today. This memorial is a testament to his life, and it should stand plainly and proudly, without interference, as a reminder to all who pass by of the true meaning of heroism."

The General added, "Last year, I was honored to stand alongside the Mayor and members of the Theater Development Fund to announce that a new design – by two talented Australian architects – had been selected for the TKTS booth which stands on Duffy Square. The design was chosen for its simplicity and beauty, and because it respects Father Duffy. Next year on May 2nd, as we celebrate the 65th anniversary of this great monument, I hope to be back here with private citizen Giuliani and members of the TDF to celebrate TKTS' grand opening."

Mayor Giuliani said, "When this site was first dedicated in 1937, New Yorkers took note of the special role that Father Duffy played both here in the City and abroad. Father Duffy was widely recognized as one of the true heroes of that time both for his courage and valor, and for his deep devotion to his faith. Time and development has, unfortunately, obscured the solemnity of that earlier event, and of what this statue symbolizes to those in the military and to the faithful. It is therefore altogether fitting that we gather on this auspicious location to remind today's generation of an earlier time, when great men made great sacrifices for the betterment of us

The new historic marker unveiled today by the City of New York reads in part, "In (sculptor) Charles Keck's bronze effigy of the soldier-priest, he depicts a stoic Duffy, nearly eight feet tall, in military garb, helmet at his feet and Bible in hand. The statue is set on a pedestal backed by a green granite Celtic cross, which is more than 17 feet tall... For decades, Keck's portrait of Father Duffy has enthralled millions of visitors to this hub of Manhattan and is a permanent reminder of the local hero who ministered in the decidedly secular world of Times Square."

As regimental chaplain of the 69th New York Infantry, known as the "Fighting 69th" and one of the most famed regiments in United States Army history, Duffy became a highly decorated soldier, receiving medals from France and the United States. In 1937, five years after his death, Father Duffy Square was dedicated in an emotional, historic ceremony. His heroic life was immortalized in the classic 1940 war film, "The Fighting 69th," in which Pat O'Brien portrays Duffy as the priest who helps the cowardly Jerry Plunkett (James Cagney) understand the true meaning of bravery.

The Coalition for Father Duffy is comprised of veterans and other civic-minded New Yorkers, and was formed in 1999 to restore dignity and respect to the Father Duffy Memorial.

Archivist's Column

At the Wichita reunion, two requested grants made to the Rainbow Foundation were approved by the Board of Trustees. We will be able to add several video pictorials to each of our four primary repositories, one on World War I veteran Paul Jarrett and another of David Dann's excellent production of "The Trail of the Rainbow."

The other and larger grant was made to the Omar Bradley Foundation, head-quartered at the U.S. Army Military History Institute in Carlisle, PA is to create and make available a computerized inventory of Rainbow materials collected there and make it available to anyone who is interested, on the Internet.

This will make both major collections, the one at the University of Nebraska and the U.S.A.M.H.I. available to the public on the Internet. Investigations are continuing on making our museum collections similarly available.

Along with transporting Regimental hospitality room supplies to the reunion, the long ride was profitable from a collection standpoint. Gary Tucky brought a full barracks bag of his service items and Stella McCray brought a box material. A collection of Al Brewers' was to be picked up but Mary Brewer took ill and was unable to bring the collection to Wichita.

The long drive to and from Kansas or other future reunion venues have run their course. Materials donors are urged to make use of the mails and/or a UPS type firm to transmit items to be processed to the archivist. A few other contributions were brought to reunion and they fit easily into the suitcase.

You may recall a recent "Reveille" article about the pilots of the 402nd Field Artillery Air Station. At reunion I met up with pilot/author Dick Clarke. He has since provided me with the completion of his story and has supported it with two copies of some 36 exquisite photographs taken while on duty. They illustrate the DivArty Air activity and the fact that there is yet much relevant Rainbow material out there.

The challenge is to get it out of those dark and dusty drawers and into a permanent repository. Please make immediate arrangements to transmit for posterity such material to your archivist.

Rainbow Returns to France

During the Memorial Day week, approximately 40 Rainbow Division veterans, family members and friends assembled in Chateau Thierry to participate in weekend memorial ceremonies honoring Rainbow soldiers, and other comrades of WWI. Saturday was our Ourcq River battlefield tour day under the guidance of 2 local experts, Florent Deludet and Gilles Langin. On Sunday morning, May 27 (French observance of American Memorial Day), the Rainbow contingent had reserved seats at the impressive Aisne-Marne, Belleau Cemetery commemorative Following which a five ceremonies. course dinner was served in the town of Fere en Tardenois, a major WWI battle site. In the afternoon, at the Oise-Aisne American Military Cemetery, our wreath, along with others were placed prominently in the amphitheater. Speakers included PNP Ted Johnson for Rainbow; M. Jacques Damery, owner of Meurcy Farm where our Rainbow plaque was unveiled later; Brigadier General Robert M. Williams, Deputy Commander V Corps; French officials; and prayer by Msgr. John F. Corr, guest of Bill Kenny. American and French military honor guards, some in WWI French and American uniforms, buglers who played both American and French versions of Taps, National anthems of both countries and presentation and retirement of colors, including the Rainbow flag with battle streamers, completed the ceremonies at the cemetery, attended by more than 1,000 people.

WWI Rainbow poet Joyce Kilmer had been killed by a sniper at privately placed a U.S. buddy poppy, and a symbolic "Rouge Banquet" at the base of his cross. At Meurcy Farm, M. Damery welcomed the many guests. The plaque was unveiled, a wreath was placed, plaque wording was read in English by Charles Fowler and in French by our Honored Member Lise Pommois. A commemorative poem "Rainbow in France" was read with French translation by Lise Pommois. At the champagne reception (Vin d'honneur) an exchange of gifts followed with a bronze Remington cowboy and bronco presented by Bill Shurtleff to Jacques Damery.

From Chateau Thierry Rainbow people traveled separately, some to WWII battle and monument sites in Alsace (Kilstett, Hatten and Haguenau), and some to other destinations in Europe.

It is to Rainbow Memorial Foundation Trustee Bill Shurtleff, that credit is owed for first conceiving and then following through with this long overdue recognition of the ordeals endured, deaths incurred and objectives seized by our WWI Rainbow predecessors, ancestors and comrades.

The acceptance speech was given by Mr. Jacques Damery, the owner of the Meurcy Farm, where the plaque was unveiled. Additional speakers were Mr. Giles Bacquaert, Sous-prefet of Chateau Thierry and Mr. Michel Alvoet, Mayor of Seringes-et-Nesles. Prior to the start of the official ceremonies at the cemetery, the traditional wreath-laying ceremonies at Fere-en-Tardenois and Nesle-en-Dole took place.

Hqs. Chapter Honors 222nd Inf. Regiment

WICHITA, KANSAS – Amidst one of the busiest training seasons the current Rainbow Division has seen in years, members of the RDVA Headquarters Chapter in Troy, New York traveled to the annual RDVA reunion for a special ceremony. On behalf of the Secretary of the Army, Brig. General Joseph Taluto, Deputy Rainbow Command for Maneuver, presented the Presidential Unit Citation to members of the 222nd Infantry Regiment for their heroic stand in the Ohlungen Forest in January 1945.

"In the military," General Taluto said, "we want to ensure that values like honor and valor are forever remembered by young soldiers. I can think of no better way than in the actions of one Rainbow Regiment in one battle – the 222nd Infantry and the defense of Alsace in 1945."

Representing th 14,000 men and women who wear the Rainbow Division shoulder patch as members of th Army National Guard, Brig. General Taluto presented the Presidential Unit Citation to the members of the regiment. The citation, which in part, reads that "Fighting back from ice-filled foxholes, the outnumbered defenders fought off wave after wave of enemy attacking all along the Regiment's front and infiltrating into friendly positions, well behind the main line of resistance. Despite the loss of 237 officers and men, the 222nd Infantry Regiment held its position, exacting a heavy toll of men and equipment on the enemy."

"These men of the Rainbow showed tremendous courage in fighting outnumbered and proved beyond any doubt that the American fighting man, with or without technology or numerical superiority, was a force to be reckoned with," General Taluto said.

Rainbow Division Hits High Marks Across the Board

FORT DIX, N.J. – With the resounding echoes of tank fire on the ranges of Fort Dix, the maneuver brigades of the 42nd Infantry Division achieved this spring one of the highest accomplishments in the Army: Rainbow tank crews qualified in platoon level live-fires, a task normally reserved only for the active duty force.

Begun in 1996 by the 86th Brigade tankers from Vermont, Rainbow gunnery standards have risen over the past five years as Major General George Garrett, the 42nd Division Commander, established the unprecedented training standard across the division.

"This was a matter of laying out the training plans and resources for our Rainbow soldiers and letting them outperform all expectations," said Colonel Mark Heffner, Rainbow Chief of Staff.

Known as Tank Table Twelve, the platoon live-fire qualification requires multiple M1 Abrams Main Battle Tanks to maneuver on a live-fire range under the control of a platoon leader. The platoon engages numerous targets with their main tank gun and machine guns in a coordinated effort to reach a platoon objective.

The active Army requires its crews to perform this training but exempts the reserve and National Guard due to the complexities and coordination to train individual crews and then platoon and company leaders in the live-fire range.

"In the Rainbow Division, we want to set a higher standard for our soldiers," said General Garrett. "We've implemented this training plan in our brigades to not only improve training, but to improve our all-around readiness. This type of planning and preparation involves the entire brigade leadership and is certainly a big motivation for our soldiers."

"This is simply the best tank training we can offer our crews," said Capt. John Burke, a former commander in the Rainbow Division's Third Brigade which qualified its first platoons last fall. "This is the ultimate challenge we can offer our tankers, and they excelled."

Rainbow tank crews from Vermont and New York completed their training and live-fire qualifications in the past two years. This spring was the first livefire from tank crews of New Jersey's 50th Brigade.
