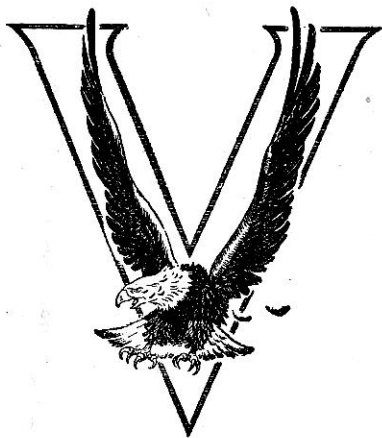

General MacArthur Takes Over For Victory



They can't keep General MacArthur off the front pages of the daily papers, and we just can't keep him off of Page One of The Reveille. Since the last issue every Rainbower's heart has been lifted with the great news that our wartime General has been transferred from Bataan to Australia and given the supreme command of the Allied war effort in the Southwest Pacific. Having urged in these columns since last December that this be done, it is needless to say that your National President is particularly gratified. No Rainbower need be persuaded of the fact that Douglas MacArthur is a big enough man for the vast and difficult task he has been assigned to perform. No man in our lifetime has been accorded the universal and spontaneous

acclaim that he has received. No military leader has ever assumed the command of Allied armies under more auspicious circumstances as far as recognition of his genius and capacity by governments, populations, and the armed forces are concerned. Unfortunately he also assumed command of a force which is conceded to be at the moment inadequate in numbers, services and supplies for the long range task before it. It is America's task to furnish the men and the armaments and supplies of all kinds which will be adequate in quantity as well as quality for the job he is expected to perform. Given even an approximation of the required force and Douglas MacArthur will sweep on from victory to victory until the final triumph we know he will achieve. That is his job; he will do it. Our job, as Americans and especially as Rainbowers, is to further by every effort and every means open to us the task of speeding a ceaseless stream of men and guns, planes and tanks, ammunition and supplies to the field of war. That is our job, and we will do it.

WAR—AND THE NATIONAL REUNION

The Reveille prints herewith a letter asking the Editor's opinion concerning the advisability of going to Orlando for the Reunion this year and the Editor's reply thereto. We believe that the doubts expressed may have occurred to many; we are convinced that the reasoning is sound in the views expressed in our reply.

Indiana, March 28, 1942

Dear Harold:

I have been wondering whether I should go to Orlando this year. It is not often that I have ever missed a Rainbow Reunion, but this year, considering the war, the demands made on all of us for financial contributions and the fact that I am working on defense production have made me wonder whether I should take such a long trip under all of the

circumstances. What is your opinion?

Dear Joe:

Your inquiry interested me very much and I have given it exceedingly careful thought before replying. My conclusion was, and is, by all means go to Orlando for the Reunion if you can possibly make it. I know that you are working hard and long hours; by July you will not only deserve a good vacation—you will need one. You can't do good work indefinitely unless you give yourself the benefit of a rest and a break in the monotony. President Roosevelt, who is, after all, our war leader, has said, " * * * it has been proven beyond doubt that human beings cannot sustain continued and prolonged work for very long without obtaining a proper balance between work, on the one hand, and vacation and recreation on the other." The President himself, with all his manifold duties and responsibilities, is constantly reported as having "left Washington for Hyde Park for a brief vacation."

He is smart enough to know that he can do more work if he stops work and regenerates his faculties with a vacation when he needs one.

Now, I do not know the condition of your tires, Joe (I don't even remember whether you generally drive to a Reunion or not). In any case, it is quite possible that you may prefer not to drive this summer even if you can make it on your tires. But, as a matter of fact, you will probably find it less expensive in the long run to take the train; your Reunion fun will probably start much sooner if you do, and you will get more real rest out of your vacation than you would if it included a long drive. Under ordinary conditions note how very many Rainbowners have decided that it was wiser to use the train (or the air lines if you can afford it!) rather than drive. So I'd advise you to take the train rather than drive.

Now, about the "war economy" angle. Knowing your circumstances, I know that you have to think about the cost of the trip. From inquiries I have made, it looks to me like this should be a rather economical Reunion. The rail fare for the long trip may be somewhat more than usual, but I understand that once you get to Orlando that all living expenses will be materially less than usual. You will probably save enough on hotel and restaurant expenses to make up the extra railroad fare cost. And anyway, you are going to need a vacation this year; by making the Reunion your vacation you'll have a better time than you would elsewhere and it isn't going to cost you any more, if as much, as it would cost at a summer resort. After all, it's Orlando's "off" season; prices there are substantially down.

So by all means go to Orlando next July; start planning now. I'm certainly going to look forward to seeing you there.

Florida Eagerly Awaits National Reunion

The National Executive Committee, at its meeting held in Washington February 22, relieved Orlando of the responsibility of furnishing entertainment, but the Orlando Reunion Committee found it was no responsibility but a pleasure to entertain Rainbow and our plans are now complete. The official dates of the Reunion as set by the Executive Committee are July 13 and 14 but the unofficial dates as planned by the Florida committee are July 11 to 15. We plan to open Sunday with open air church services in Eola Park on the afternoon of July 11. All of the churches of Orlando will participate in these services, but the services will be in charge of our National Chaplain, Rev. John A. Callan. For the folks who arrive Saturday night or Sunday morning, appropriate services will be held in all Orlando churches Sunday morning, and, by the way, this town is known as "The City of Churches." Sunday night, following the church services, the A. C.'s will hold their annual election and dinner. Monday, the 13th, will be the first business session, the greeting of out-of-town guests by our local committee, and, I presume, the nomination of officers. That part of the program will have to be worked out with the National Committee. Monday evening, following the meeting, we will have a barbecue, dance, entertainment, etc. This will be held down town at the American Legion Home, which has a capacity of 3,500 people, giving us ample room to move about. It has nice powder rooms for the ladies, bar, etc. This affair will be open to Rainbowners only. On Tuesday, the 14th, we have our second meeting, followed by our annual dinner and capped by what we believe will be a very beautiful Champagne Hour. As you know, the Champagne Hour runs over into the wee small hours of the morning and plans have been made to unofficially extend the Reunion until July 15, at which time the local committee will furnish entertainment, sightseeing trips, etc., for the visiting Rainbowners.

We now have over a hundred reservations and if you desire a room with any particular group, or any special type of room, it is suggested that you get your reservations in at once so that the committee may take care of you. You write us and tell us just exactly what kind of a room you desire and how much you wish to pay, and we have the room. In a later issue we will devote an entire page to hotel rates and at that time if you have not made your reservation you can select the room you want and if they are not all gone we will fill your order. The Committee wishes to impress you with the fact that if you want a room for, say, \$4.00, then \$4.00 will be the limit you will pay and you will not find that you have to take a \$6.00 or \$7.00 room after arriving. That is, if you make your reservations at this time.

For the benefit of our sightseeing brothers and sisters: Located within one hour's driving distance of Orlando is Rainbow Springs, Silver Springs, the Fountain of Youth, Bok Tower and other nationally and internationally known places.

If you desire to fish, we are so close to the lakes that you may cast your line out of the hotel windows and catch a bass.

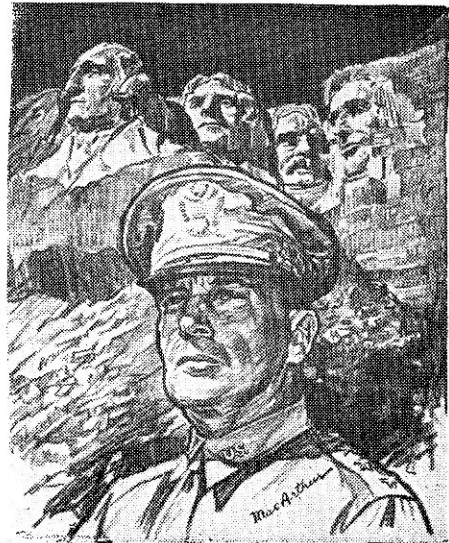

We close with an invitation to each and every Rainbowner and members of a Rainbow family to come to Orlando in July.

Speeches were the minor parts of this great drama with the showing of the revised World War films of the 168th Infantry.
