In pondering over the several things that seemed proper to say, we find ourselves convinced that we of the 1917-1919 class can only talk of the things that we know about Rainbow. Conclusively, what we know about Rainbow is made up of our Rainbow experiences. So we arrive at a true perspective and realize that you newer men of more recent history, know Rainbow, too.

We older Vets have read of your tactics, your objectives and of your deeds. There need be no comment made by us for the exploits that you have so gallantly achieved. So it is best for us to call to your attention some of the parts of Rainbow that we know of.

We have done all of these things time and time again, and you will too. Our contribution to Rainbow has been made, we can add little to it except to hold it together and hold it tight. It's one class now. 1917-1946, our Rainbow, and it is all ours.—Newark, Ohio, Reveille.

PENNSYLVANIA — The Pennsylvania State Chapter, headed by Francis H. Lehr, at its last meeting, transmitted the following tribute to Randy Randolph for publication in the Reveille.

On October 25 the Pittsburgh Chapter, and Rainbow in particular, suffered a great loss in the sudden death of Randy (Ralph C.) Randolph in New York. Randy was the second president of the Pennsylvania State Association. He came to Pittsburgh and immediately associated himself with the Pittsburgh Chapter, serving as President for two years and as secretary for three years. His thoughtfulness and enthusiasm added greatly to the interest shown in our Chapter and added new life to the organization. His letters and bulletins were so interesting that they received favorable comment from Rainbow Chapters all over the country. His organizing ability caused our membership to increase, and his letter-writing ability will never be surpassed. He had the same fine results as State President of the Pennsylvania Association. The National organization also recognized his fine work and tireless efforts, and

in 1943-1944 he was elected a National Vice President. He was a gentleman, a fine fellow and a good Rainbower. We all regret his passing and will miss him.

TEXAS—Dallas—The December meeting of

Texas Chapter found the membership still seething with wrath against the breach of faith on the part of the War Department in awarding the numeral "42" to the State of New York to be used by them as a National Guard divisional identification number, and the Chapter passed a resolution voicing its violent opposition to the step and requiring the secretary to so inform the Secretary of War. May we commend California Rainbower Warner Grassel on having so ably outlined and detailed our so justifiable gripe. It may be a bit optimistic to hope that the Voice of Rainbow—some 40,000 strong—could cause the order to be rescinded, but we owe it to our comrades, living and dead, to preserve our heroic and hallowed "42" as a memorial to the two World Wars, and not be permitted to be kicked around, a political football, to be parceled out as local state patronage. We recognize the rights of "The Fighting 69th" of World War I to their fair share: one twenty-sixth; we also recognize the right of New York Staters of World War II to their fair share in the 42d's illustrious past as both of these groups assisted in its creation, but we can conceive of no equitable manner wherein the War Department can assign, nor the State of New York accept, that which history has given recognition to the men of the nation as a whole, as being representative of the 42d Division. As Warner so aptly points out, there is no limit to the other numbers that could have been assigned the New York N.G. division, while it remains vastly unfair to all Rainbowers, including those of New York, to narrow "42" from its national status to become merely the numerical designation of a state National Guard unit. The Rainbow Reveille editor may scissor or blue-pencil the hell out of the foregoing, but it won't change the mind nor the attitude of hundreds of Texas Rainbowers.

Final plans were made, coincident with the birth of Texas Chapter's monthly periodical, The Rainbow Round-up, for the Spring Round-Up of members for this chapter. Recognizing the fact that the number of delegates we send to the National Reunion is in ratio to our

actual paid-up membership, we shall go forth into battle with the slogan: "Every-Member-Get-a-Member."

While the January meeting will be held at the same time and on the same day, a change of locale has been effected. We shall dine, me hearties, at the Downtown YMCA, 605 N.
