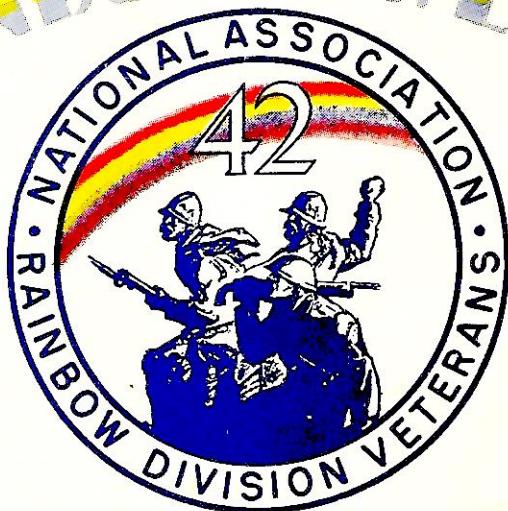

With that purpose in mind, I am hereby requesting all Chapter Presidents to designate an "ON TO DETROIT" Chairman, and to send me his name and address.

I am hereby asking my fieldmen, the National Executive Committeemen, to act as field liaison representatives of National and to work with the Chapter Presidents in selecting as the "ON TO DETROIT" chairman, men who will be in Detroit and have the time and willingness to work with this problem.

"ON TO DETROIT" Committee Chairmen should have available by the 22nd of February a preliminary list of all who expect to attend the Detroit reunion and send one copy to the reunion chairman and one copy to the National President. This list should be kept up-to-date with the reports on the 22nd of each month.

It is always difficult to stretch hotel accommodations at the last minute. It is a simple problem if ample time is given.

The reunion program may have as one of its features the dedication of a Rainbow Room in the new Veterans Building on the riverfront, which has been provided for veterans in Detroit, by the City, at a cost of \$5,000,000.00.

The dedication of this room might tie in very well with the Champagne Hour and make it necessary to hold the banquet and dance on Saturday, July 15th. The final decision such as the extending of the reunion for one day will be cleared at the Executive Committee meeting in Chicago on February 22nd.

Your President is interested in hearing from Rainbowners in the field as to whether this change in the anticipated program by the addition of July 15th for the banquet date would cause any inconvenience.

The Champagne Hour would of course be held at eleven o'clock on July 14th.

Quite often one hears criticism of the discussion in the National and Chapter papers of the matter of paid-up memberships. It is strange that any pressure should have to be developed in order to acquire the necessary wherewithal to maintain the activities of the Rainbow Division.

RAINBOW PILGRIMAGE

France today appears as it did in 1917. It seems to have recovered from the last world war. The people seem reasonably comfortable and happy. Of course, France still belongs to the French. Water is used to wash with. Manurepiles adorn village streets. Drivers sound their horns continuously and conversation goes on at a terrific pace with the hands.

WE left Paris early and began to see Rainbow territory as we came into Luzancy on the Marne. My ambulance company had spent a restful week here before the battle of Chateau-Thierry. Approaching the city of Chateau-Thierry the immense American War Monument came into view. Since it is located on a high hill and is constructed of pure white stone it can be seen for miles. A map engraved on its face shows the territory fought for and won by the American Divisions taking part in the conflict. The city has not changed much although the bridges were again destroyed in the last war and are still rebuilding. I inspected the railroad station where our ambulance company loaded thousands of wounded during the battle.

EPieds, where our company had an ambulance dressing station, is just as it must have been before 1917. Our dressing station on the main road located at the foot of a hill with a battlefield cemetery in the backyard, is still here. However, there is none of the roar of artillery or the din of traffic supplying an infantry division in combat. Perhaps a solitary individual was visible. As I stood for a moment on the plot in front of the house which was our dressing station, I remembered a young wounded soldier who lay on his stretcher there. He wanted to give his place in an ambulance to some other soldier because he felt that he was going to die, and wished that someone else might have the benefit of hospital care. We moved him to one side and in an hour he was dead.

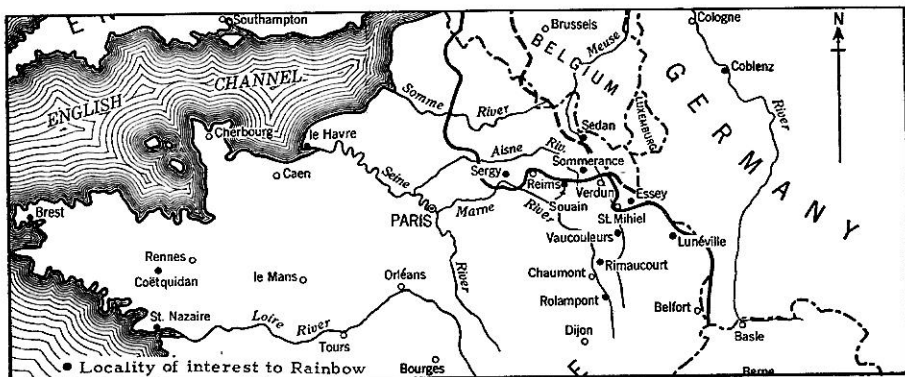
WE visited many places in the Chateau-Thierry battlefield which recall memories to Rainbows - Beauvarde, Sergy,

and Serienes and Nesles. War damage has disappeared entirely. The stone and plaster used here soon weathers and takes on the appearance of age. Traversing roads which in other days would have invited sudden death, we found it hard to imagine and remember that one of the bloody and decisive battles of history had been fought here.

AT Rhiems we examined the cathedral which is still under repair after having been damaged in the second world war as it was in the first. A few miles further on we began to see familiar names on the road signs and we came to Suipps, Chepy, St. Hilaire, and Bussy-LeChateau. Small French towns are difficult to recognize after a lapse of years because they usually have no outstanding landmarks. However, when we came to Barle-duc, Commercy, Toul, and Nancy, they seemed quite familiar and one felt sure there must be some doughboys about. Outside of Nancy is a tremendous red granite monument erected to the Resistance Movement.

ON Sunday morning, July 10th, we crossed the Meuse Valley into Vaucouleurs. The Meuse seemed small compared to its place in history. Vaucouleurs, which was Division Headquarters in 1917 and an important location in the life of Joan of Arc, was just as it was the day that we left it before Christmas in 1917. I had no trouble in locating my old quarters. Pictures were in order of course and we soon had an audience. The couple whose home it was in 1917 soon appeared to greet us and everybody seemed glad to meet a veteran of l'armee Americaine of 1917. We located our company office, now a cow shed, examined the barns where we were quartered, and imagined again the time when Ambulance Company #168 fell in for roll call on the Rue Domremy. Two ancient ladies acted as interpreters in our conversation with a group of neighbors, all of whom appeared to have a lively interest in Americans and in the fact that we had come back to visit them after so long a time.

AT the cordial invitation of the mayor we proceeded to the City Hall and were met at the steps by M. Henri Siffert,



President du Syndicat d'Initiative, together with other city officials. It was Sunday but the City Hall was opened and we were escorted to a large room which had served as Division Headquarters. The Commanding Officer of the Division and General MacArthur had their headquarters in this room. It is quite bare now but it occurred to me that it would be a proper setting for a commemorative Rainbow flag or plaque. Champagne and speeches made the occasion almost official. The French officials emphasized the warmth of friendship between our two countries and the pleasant memories which Vaucouleurs had for the Rainbow Division. We in turn had to outline for the group all the subsequent adventures of the Division after it had left Vaucouleurs for other fronts. We were shown a statue of Joan of Arc which had been presented to Vaucouleurs in 1940 by American Ambassador Bullitt. The mayor explained that Vaucouleurs had not been able to erect this statue in a prominent place because it had arrived at a 'bad time,' for in 1940 the clouds of war were already forming over France. Its temporary resting place was on an artillery carriage placed within the church. A hole in the base of the statue was pointed out as the receptacle for the exchange of communications by the Resistance Movement.

E were presented with a written greeting of "very great and profound friendship for the Americans of the Rainbow Division stationed in Vaucouleurs in 1917." Your correspondent's French was not quite equal to an appropriate reply but his wife and the mayor sounded the proper note of sincerity and friendship by speaking in their native tongues with hands over their hearts and with tears in their eyes. A quick visit to the crypt where Joan of Arc prayed, an inspection of the castle of Count of Baudricourt, a glance at the factory where plaster casts were made for the Statue of Liberty, and we were on our way back to Paris to catch our plane for the States.
