KOREA If I weren't the world's worst correspondent, (which I am)

I'd still have an excuse for not writing, the excuse being the current unpleasantness which I have been engaged in since we landed at Pusan last August. But when the January issue of the REVEILLE reached me here in my tent last night I resolved that all of the papers and reports, and the Generals who are screaming for them, could wait a little longer while I took the time to say Hello to all the Rainbow gang through the paper. In this way I can thank "Johnny Walker" Colston for his Christmas card, tell John Janosik that his message got all the way through to Korea, let Marshall Andrews know that my wife heard him on the American Forum a couple of weeks ago; and get a message through to my home Chapter in Washington, D. C., the few left behind at Fort Lewis, and the Chicago mob -- where Mort Barnard, Newman Donnell and Bob Snodell have taken up bragging about how big their Chapter is in the best traditions of those WW I braggarts who founded it, and who did such a magnificent job in launching the second Rainbow at Gruber in July '43. The memory of that Reunion in Tulsa and the '49 show in New York is enough to make me go AWOL; but if I'm going to make Birmingham I'd better wait for rotation or a million-dollar wound. It would never do for one of your National Committeemen to sit out the Reunion in the Pusan Stockade -- although it wouldn't be the first time that a Rainbower honored the inside of a guardhouse!

While I think of it, both John Wintrose and I want to apologize to President Foster and the gang for our failure as Committeemen. The Army just wouldn't allow us to cooperate in exercising our duties in that office, but decided instead to put us on the Greeting Committee for Joe Stalin's stooges, along with the rest of the 2nd Division. And, as you may have read in the papers, this greeting business is a full-time job requiring the services of a Grave-Digging Subcommittee for our Chinese and North Korean customers. And while we haven't won yet, it isn't the fault of our Rainbow veterans over here, from Honorary President Douglas MacArthur on down. Here's what some of the Fort Lewis Chapter have done:

Gib Sherrard (G-3 and Chief of Staff, WW II) commanded the Third Battalion of the 23rd Infantry on the Naktong, and led it during the breakthrough to the west on 16 September, winning a Silver Star before he was wounded by an enemy mortar concentration at Anui, in South Central Korea, on the 26th. Hear he is now at Walter Reed Hospital convalescing nicely. Ken Koeber (222nd) was Commanding Officer of our 2nd CIC Detachment, working with G-2 until last month--when X Corps grabbed him, proving you can't keep a good man down.

Mike Dolan, also a major and also 222nd, stuck it out until late January, when an impacted disk in his vertebrae forced him out thru medical channels; but not until he had done a superb job as G-3 for Air, bringing in those fighters and bombers which so often saved the day for the infantry. He's now at Percy Jones General Hospital, Battle Creek, Michigan. Lieutenant Clements (ex-Sergeant, 232nd) got a Silver Star, a wound and a trip home all at once. Lientenant Moore (ex-MP and overweight!) stopped a bullet, was patched up and is now at the Taegu PX selling (you guessed it!) beer! I'll have to go down there and see him one of these days. Rainbow patch ought to be good for a case!

Our Stewart Jackson (167th Infantry) from Ensley, Alabama, has dug up the original banquet ticket that admitted him to the S.O.L. Rainbow Banquet on Friday May 23, 1919, in the Restaurant Voltaire, Place de l'Odéon, Paris, France.

In February we reported on a trip to Europe made last summer by Lyle Williams (Hq.-222d Inf.). Another letter from Lyle told that he and his wife, on their 4000-mile bicycle trip through 13 countries, followed, as nearly as possible, parts of the combat route followed by the Rainbow.

Along the route Lyle says he was able to spot a number of houses where his platoon (I & R) had been billeted. They passed through Winsbach, where he recalled that new "longies" and clean socks had been issued. He recognized a country house where the platoon's German-speaking Fritz Krenkler had flushed 14 Krauts out of the cellar. They stayed overnight in Gunzenhausen this time, as he had in 1945. At Dachau they saw many spots connected with Rainbow history. They continued through Munich to Trostberg, Salzburg and Linz to Vienna. They also visited Marseille, Wurzburg, Schwaz, Worgl and Zell am See, where the Rainbow University was located in 1945. Though their is still an army school there, it is no longer the quiet village it was in 1945. "The tourists

have discovered it," Lyle writes.

He highly recommends a trip such as this for any Rainbower who is able to make it. He says he contemplates repeating part of the trip some time in the future, if the opportunity presents itself.

NEWS NOTES -- Back in service are Newman Donnell (Div Hq) and Glenn E. Carter (222nd Inf). Donnell is Captain in the C I C at Fort Holabird, Md., and Carter is a first sarge at Fort Belvoir, Virginia. . . The Rev. James A. Connett, former Chaplain in the 222nd Infantry, made some beautiful colored photographs of the Rainbow Trail on a recent trip to

Major Vic Strom (242nd) has succeeded "Bird" Slade and Harry Marshard as Special Services Officer, dispensing morale, good-will and cheer, bottled and otherwise, meanwhile hiding his Combat Infantry Badge under his coat so that I won't send him in the next patrol to the 38th Parallel. Captain John Hinton, who joined us at Salzburg from the 66th Division, after the war, is the best company commander in the 2nd today, leading the Tank Company of the 38th Infantry. If you don't think that is a tough job you should try it. Sergeant John Trout (242nd) is collecting medals with the 38th, also. Lieut. Colonel Jack Daly, our Division Artillery S-3 at Gruber, won the DSC while commanding the 555th Field Artillery Battalion. And that leaves John Wintrobe, that grand old soldier and combat veteran of both Rainbows, who (as you know) won the DSC in 1918 and was top-kick of Anti-Tank Company, 222nd, in the last war. Unfortunately, the medics got their hooks on John last week and sent him to the rear for a heart check-up; but I hope he will be back. If not, he certainly deserves a rest in the States, where he can visit his older son, now finishing his Plebe year at West Point. The only note of real sadness is the case of Major Charley Fry (142nd Engineers), who, as Executive Officer of the Second Engineers fought his battalion as infantry at Kuni-ri for over a week while the Division covered the retreat of the Eighth Army from the Chungchon River. I last saw Charley November 29 as I was making an end-run around a Chinese roadblock to our rear with half of the Division CP, and the next day he was Missing in Action. I can't believe that they ever got this cheerful, fearless, solid citizen and soldier, and we're hoping that he is still alive, possibly wounded and taken prisoner. But time will tell, and in the meanwhile, that's about it.

Of course you all know that General Collins, "Father Rainbow" to those of us from WW II, now commands the Eighth Infantry Division at Camp Jackson, North Carolina. I suspect that the Reunion Committee had something to do with that assignment, so near Birmingham!

Me? I'm still G-1 of the Second Division and shuffling papers -- and a deck of cards once in a while. The pleasures of the Forward Echelon are strictly limited, mostly a question of survival in rice paddies which are muddy during the day and frozen at night. But if John Callan will do his stuff with the Lord, I may see you all at the Reunion. Best of luck, anyway.
