We have just finished up a series of important affairs which have involved the whole of Rainbow. All of this is to say that as an organization we are in business and going strong. For an organization thirty-five years old with a closed membership eligibility, this is pretty darned good. It is wonderful, in fact. It is proof positive that our Association has a vitality and an

Let us take the "Little Reunion" at Chicago, held February 22nd in conjunction with the Midyear Meeting of the National Executive Committee. 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MORTON MARKS REMARKS --

The calendar shows almost seven years since that day in May, 1945, when hostilities ceased in Europe, and Rainbow had reached its last combat objective.

When we stop to reflect, we can easily realize that in this world of today, one can hardly get close enough to his fellow man to know him well. Not so in war, though. Those of us who served in either war can attest to that. Why, you are a brother to the man who is responsible for protecting you, and, reciprocally, you are the guardian of his life -- for the time, at least.

Then the war ends. No more danger. And what happens? Do you forget those who held that life-line? Not hardly. The men of the WW I Rainbow didn't. And neither will you.

Recently a WW I Rainbower told me, "The younger men are not like us. They aren't 'joiners.' "

Look at the membership of the American Legion, the VFW, he reasoned. World War II membership has dropped off consistently -- since 1946 and 1947.

But our Association is not -- and never will be -- like those organizations. Ours has a different purpose -- to keep alive that spirit of Rainbow that brought us through the war and to join as a memorial to our departed comrades.

Our Association is not political. It is not for flag-waving. It is simply for brotherhood. As we were brothers-in-action for a common cause, we band together for that single purpose described above.

We of the younger Rainbow will continue with that purpose so long as we live. And this gesture will continue to gather momentum, as we grow older.

No, Rainbow will not die.

After much deliberation the D. C. Chapter adopted this date several years ago, as a Commemoration Day for Rainbowners of WW II. It was found to be the most suitable date of significance which occurred, after the Division had united in France on February 10, 1945.

Looking back since the first WW II Rainbowner joined the D. C. Chapter in 1945, it seems the boys from the "Little War" literally turned over operation of the Chapter to the men of the "Big War." In the past six years, four of the Chapter Presidents have been WW II men, a WW II man has been Secretary since 1945, and this year the "old boys" even let the young men handle the money by electing a WW II Treasurer. We in D. C. are especially proud that two of our WW II men have held National office - Romeo Fagiolo as National Vice President and Marshall Andrews as National Historian. In order not to completely retire the WW I men, the Chapter has tacitly adopted a policy of alternating our Presidents between men of the two wars. And, most important of all, long ago dropped the reference of distinction between men of WW I and WW II.
