GENERAL COLLINS URGES WORLD WAR II MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

AS TENTH ANNIVERSARY OF RAINBOW' REACTIVATION NEARS

(Editor's Note: Bob Kubik was appointed Associate Editor of the REVEILLE this year with the general assignment of collecting news of WW IIers, making suggestions as to WW II editorial policy, and generally stirring up WW II activity. The following communication does a bang-up job on all three fronts. Bob has come up with news, with shrewd suggestions, and has secured from General Collins an appeal to World War II men to put on a membership drive which is reproduced on page 4.)

I've read "Off the Hook" - but me thinkst that this is On the Hook! How did I ever "volunteer" for this Associate Editor's job? First it happened that my old 1st Sergeant Liptak put me on the spot with a place at the head table at Miami - and then some other kind soul picks me for special duty. Oh shucks, always some one to pull rank!

I'm short on any really first rate news but I do hope that ALL WW IIers will send their present address and occupation to me for we all want to make the 10th Anniversary of Reactivation and the 35th Annual Rainbow Reunion the biggest event of all.

In the light of this I took the liberty of writing to General Harry J. Collins, (at his new Command of the 31st Infantry Division, at Camp Atterbury, Ind.) My first request was for the names of men who had served with the 42nd and are in the service now with the 31st. He sent me the following names:

Kit doesn't know how to do anything but FIGHT for a BIGGER and BETTER RAINBOW! (Please note: all men who served with any "G" Co's, WW II and especially all WW II 222nd men, "G" Co. Chapter is now our "home" Chapter; we've been adopted and our second Annual Reunion will be held in Greebfield, Ohio, next August. Of course we'll all plan that in Chicago, July 12 - 14.

Well, anyhow, in my letter of thanks to General Collins I asked him to write

a word to all WW II men urging them to join - and to helpenlist others to become real ACTIVE Rainbowers. The enclosed was his reply. (See next page.)

Oh yes, I will quote the P.S. to Gen. Collins' letter, "...I will certainly be present at the National Reunion in Chicago next July if at all possible."

Other news was that Col. Luongo, 222nd, has returned from service in Turkey.

I suggest that we use space in the REVEILLE each issue for WW II gossip; asking news in each issue from a particular outfit, i.e., 222nd Reg. in January; 232nd in February; 242nd in March; Anti-tank, Artillery, Medics, etc. Let's see if the boys will just pour in their occupation, family, hobbies, etc. As of now I have news and addresses of about 75 men of the 222nd.

(Editors Note to Bob: Get a column on this to me by December 20th!)

More power is needed in our appeal to every Rainbow wife; for I found way back in '46 and '47 when I helped organize the Chapter in Omaha that if you do not draw the wife into the work you don't have an active member.

In Miami we had a WW II Night and that evening many of the 222nd boys decided we'd have a WW II - 222nd dinner or breakfast in Chicago during or maybe just before the Reunion. We want to appeal to all their 222nd buddies to join up so the REVEILLE can carry news of this kind of an event that we hope will become annual.

Continue the fine job you are, & have always done, to make the mail that brings the REVEILLE the highlight of the month.

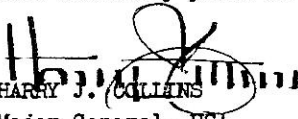
TO MEMBERS OF THE RAINBOW DIVISION, WORLD WAR II:
