In Miami Reunion circles, the gals are coming along, now that the guys have gotten well started.

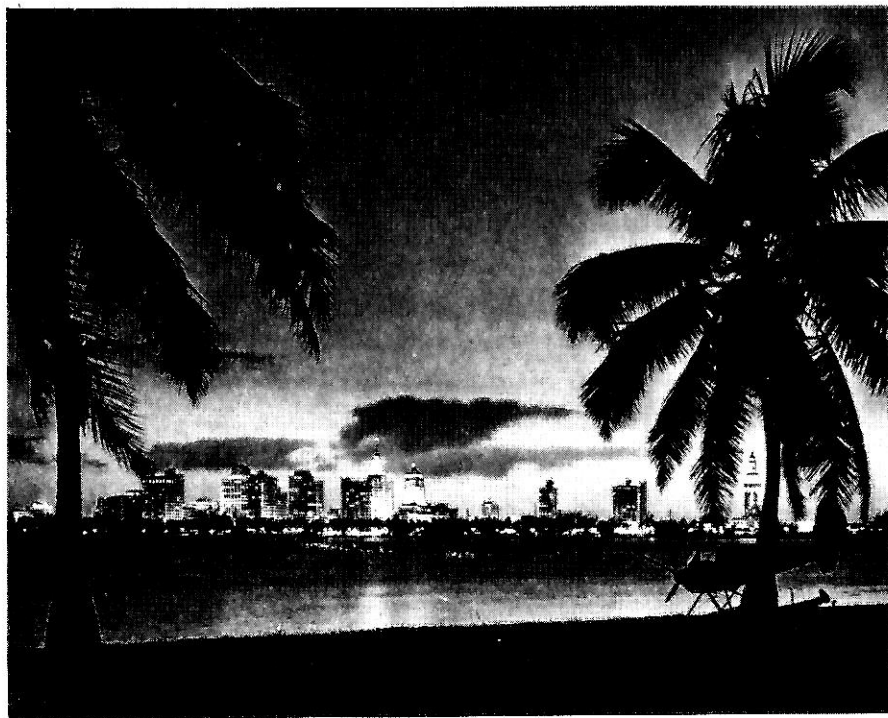
Auxiliary Reunion Chairman Mary Liptak has named her Executive Committee, as follows:

"DER RAINBOW WACHT UM DER RHINE"

* * *

This story, which appeared in the February issue of The Rainbow Communique, the monthly publication of Mortimer H. Jordan Chapter of Birmingham, Alabama, was written by C. L. Ragsdale of the Communique staff. Each issue of the Communique is featured with a story of some particular incident in the history of "Alabama's Own", who no doubt are better known to Rainbowers as, "Bill" Screws "Gang".

"DO YOU REMEMBER?" is a phrase which should be copyrighted by the veterans of the late A. E. F., in-as-much as this expression comes into prominence when two or more ex-chow hounds meet, regardless of the time, occasion or place, so it is only fitting that any article or story pertaining to the activities of the late 167th Infantry, A. E. F., be prefaced with these words, "Do you remember?"

Do you remember the story of the 167th on the Rhine, or are you one of the poor unfortunates who due to your inability to dodge all of the scrap iron and G. I. cans that the "square heads" flung at us in the last phase of the Argonne, managed to collect a piece of this metal in some part of your cooty-laden body, which gave you a free pass to the S. O. S., where after your period of convalescing was over you learned that your outfit was "beaucoup kilometers" away and that your chances to get back to your buddies was "je ne plus", that you were destined to remain in France in some casual company until it befell your turn to head for the U. S. via Brest? If this was your lot, buddy, you don't know what you missed, for the stay on the Rhine was the only bright spot of our sojourn in Europe. Of course we had our hardships, had to get up for "chow" at 7 A. M., drill for two hours in the intricate movements of "squads east and west," which movements had become rather foreign to us during the fighting days, and occasionally pull a maneuver for the members of the General Staff of G. H. Q., who were anxious to show us how the war

should have been fought, but outside of this, our chief worry was the accumulation of enough marks to provide us with our quota of schnapps and Rhine wine. Soldiering de luxe is the term best fitted to cover the stay on the Rhine, for any man who did not have a private room with all the necessary trimmings, was considered rather rotten as a policer. To call a company out for a formation it was necessary to call at the home of each frau in the village and request the presence of Private John Doe in his respective platoon in Strasse Wilhelm. Each platoon sergeant had to use half of his platoon as runners to find the remaining half, who were usually A. W. O. L.

The one outstanding event of the "Der Rhine Wacht" was the arrival of a carload of fresh eggs consigned to the 167th Infantry, which caused more excitement and discussion than the signing of the Armistice. With eggs selling for a mark each, or six for a cake of issue soap, you can imagine the surprise of the mess sergeants when they were told to report to the Supply Company for their allotment of "des oeufs," same being four dozen per man. The true story of the shipment will never be known, but suffice to say that enough has been written about this shipment to rival a late edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica. At any rate, the news spread rapidly to the other regiments of the division as well as to other allied units in the area, from which outfits we had our share of visitors for the duration of the eggs.

Oh, yes! that question of the scarcity

of soap of the issue variety is one that the State Department at Washington should investigate. The chief worry of the mess sergeant while in France was to hide and dispose of the accumulation of soap prior to the cleaning of a town for parts unknown. Buck privates could have all they wanted for the asking, but "how the worm did turn" when the Rhine was reached. The German fraus were using a brand of soap which was about as desirable for washing purposes as sand paper, due to the lack of animal fats. They soon acquired a taste for our issue soap, in fact a cake of soap was a card of admittance into the families of the most elite Heinies—thereby hangs a tale. Those buck privates, who had nothing but hyphenated words for the mess sergeant in former days, became as friendly toward this said party as possible, making every effort to get in his good graces, for was not he the "guardian of the golden treasure," namely, the soap issue? The money standard of Germany at that time may have been marks, but ask any former member of the regiment what it was and his prompt reply is, "SOAP!"

We were fortunate enough to have in our Divisional Area a place formerly used by the Germans as a health resort, called Bad Neuenahr, which was promptly converted into a divisional leave area, where a certain quota of men from each unit could go each day for the baths similar to those of Hot Springs, and to enjoy the entertainment provided by the Y, which was functioning at that time one hundred per cent. There was an immense theatre at Neuenahr, which was used for the entertainments, adjoining which was a casino, where we were served with delightful meals of issue grub highly camouflaged by the German civilian cooks employed. In the Kur Theatre the Rainbow Division Veterans organization was formed on March 28th, 1919, the meeting being attended by delegations from each unit of the Division, who were allowed a voting strength according to the number of men in their respective units. The only thing the "Alabama" asked for that day was the privilege of entertaining the Rainbow Vets in their first reunion in the United States, which was graciously accorded them, Birmingham being selected as the city for this singular honor. If you were not so fortunate as to be present at this first reunion in the States' just ask any of those that attended as to whether or not it was a success.

Naturally a dough boy is of a roving

disposition, always wanting to explore those points which are marked "verboten," which accounts for the large numbers of visitors that usually departed from Sinzig on the late afternoon train each Saturday, headed in the general direction of Cologne, which city was in the British area and was out of bounds of the American troops. In order to obtain a legitimate pass to visit in Cologne it was necessary to go through the channels up to G. H. Q. for approval. However, I dare say that a majority of the members of the regiment took the old "French leave" or A. W. O. L. route, and made a thorough check of the many cabarets located in Cologne, although they always gave as their excuse for going that they were anxious to inspect the Cologne Cathedral, of which we had heard so much. It had been rumored that it was necessary to charter a special train one particular Sunday to bring back to the divisional area the large number of A. W. O. L.'s of the division who were rounded up in Cologne by the soldats usually referred to as "those that won the war."

On April 5, 1919, the regiment was loaded up in new American made "40's and 8's" at the station in Sinzig for their first leg of the journey back to the States. Judging from the number of frauleins and fraus that were present to see us off, one would have thought that the troops leaving were those of their own native land, instead of having been a part of those that comprised the Army of Occupation. The stay on the Rhine was certainly a hard part of the "La Guerre" and those that missed it will never know of the pleasure that should have been theirs.

In the next war, buddy, provided it is not in Mexico, if they ask you, "Do you want to go with the Army of Occupation?" just take one step forward and yell, "OUI" as loud as you can.

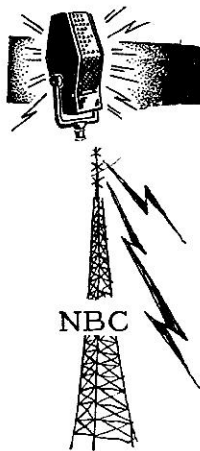
