Mother Stack and Mother Kitt exemplify the spirit of service practiced by the members of our Auxiliary, and we salute all of them.

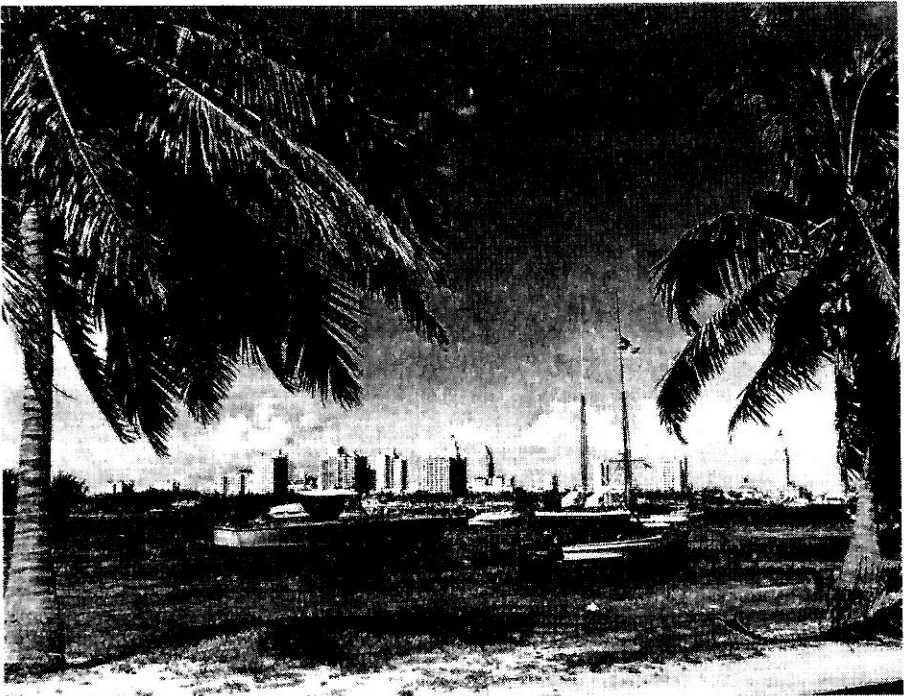

Among other Rainbowers present were 1952 Reunion Chairman James F. Barney, of Miami; National Membership Chairman Leonard J. Hill, Tulsa; Arthur C. MacDonald, President, Baltimore Chapter; and Fred L. Edwards, Berkeley California, Past President of the San Francisco Chapter.

Messages were read from General Collins, Warner Grassell, Jim Rolfe, Homer and Ethel Gardner, PNP Wilber Brucker, PNP John Mangan, and others.

SECRETARY GIBBONS reported membership this year 218 ahead, with a total of 5,183 as of Feb. 15th. He expressed the hope that Chapters will continue their fine work.

TREASURER BARROW rendered a financial report, in which the balance sheet showed a surplus as of July 14, 1951, of \$5,285.17, and an excess of income over receipts between then and Jan. 31, 1952, of \$2,180.87, for a total surplus of \$7,566.04. He called attention to the fact that some of our War Bonds mature in June, 1952. On motion

he was directed to hold the bonds without cashing them in, continuing to draw the interest thereon.

HISTORIAN SEAMAN asked and received, authority to purchase and have placed, July 14, 1952, a wreath on the grave of General Gouraud. No action was taken on a proposal that the Association sponsor the sale, on a commission basis, of a recent biography of General Douglas MacArthur.*

REUNION CHAIRMAN BARNEY unveiled some of the plans for the Reunion at Miami, Fla., July 12th, 13th, and 14th. He said the Registration fee will be \$10.00 for each person registering. Headquarters will be at the McAllister and Columbus Hotels; men's meetings on the roof of the Columbus, Ladies' meetings in the McAllister. The Early Bird party on Friday, July 11; the Grand Ball on Saturday July 12th; services at a church only four blocks from the hotels, by Chaplain John Callan, Sunday July 13, with the second business session that afternoon, when committee assignments will be announced. Sunday evening will be free for "Reunioning" after committees have met and prepared their reports for presentation at the final session on the morning of July 14th. In the evening the Banquet and the Champagne Hour.

LEONARD HILL, National Membership Chairman, reported "Our National membership total was 5,183 on Feb. 15, as compared with 4,965 the same date in 1951, making us 218 ahead of last year. Thirteen states have already exceeded last year's total. Several Chapters, including Texas, Tulsa, Chanute, Bloomington, LaFayette, Denver, Orlando, Martinsville, Omaha, Columbus and 132nd Signal Company have already established new, all-time highs. Total membership is now 87% of the total of 5,967 established last year; 17 states, including the National Chapter, are under last year's figures, but 11 of these need only a few more to reach that goal. Six of the larger Chapters need 745 to reach last year's total. It is interesting to note that nearly all the states that President Butts has visited have already exceeded their 1951 totals. It is very important that more WW II veterans be encouraged to join and also to take an active part in Chapter activities. It takes a lot of time to accomplish this but it can be done. The 132nd Signal Co. Chapter (Youngstown, Ohio,) leads in WW II membership with 75. Tulsa is second with 50, and Illinois third with 47.

WORLD WAR II RAINBOW COLORS

ROBERT TAYLOR, Chairman of a special committee to investigate and report on what measures should be taken to preserve the Colors carried by the Rainbow Division in WW II, reported as follows: "The Colors are at present on a standard, at the Liberty Memorial in Kansas City, Mo. The directors of the Memorial, contacted thru Col. Ruby Garrett, advised that they will agree to any method we adopt to encase or otherwise preserve these Colors.

"After investigating various plans it was determined that the most feasible method would be to construct a case approximately 18" square and 6' to 7' high in which the colors could be placed on the present standard. It was found that such a case could be constructed for about \$175.00. This method is recommended."

In the ensuing discussion, Col. Garrett offered to carry through with this plan. PNP Al Hoyt felt that the matter should be referred to the WW II members at the Miami Reunion to ascertain their preferences.

Reunion Chairman Jim Barney offered, on behalf of the Miami Reunion Corporation, to assume the \$175.00 cost. On motion of Col. Monroe Johnson, duly seconded and carried, the generous offer of the Miami Reunion Corporation was accepted with thanks.

ARTHUR C. MacDONALD, President of the Maryland Chapter, then presented a resolution of his Chapter, as follows:

"WHEREAS, for many years the Association has observed the memorable occasions *** Feb. 22 and July 14 *** and

WHEREAS: There are now many members of our organization who fought WW II in the Rainbow Division, it is felt that in order to accord fitting recognition to the brilliant record of the WW II Rainbow, a memorable occasion in its history should be suitably observed, on the national level; and

WHEREAS: It appears that all of the WW II Rainbowners are not of one mind as to what event should be observed, nor how it should be observed, nor when;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the following plan be laid before the National President.

"The National President shall instruct each Chapter to select one delegate to the forthcoming National Reunion who shall be instructed as to the consensus of opinion of the WW II members of his own Chapter on the subject of suitable observance of a memorable event from the history of the WW II Rainbow Division.

"These ** delegates ** shall meet

at a special and separate session during the forthcoming National Reunion to determine what, in the opinion of such special session, is the most suitable event in the history of the WW II Rainbow to be observed by the Association, nationally; and what is the most suitable time for the observance. A committee from such special session shall report the findings of their session to the final session of the National Reunion, for adoption or rejection.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Maryland Chapter, in the interest of continued strength, harmony and fellowship in our organization, respectfully urges the National President to act favorably on the plan here submitted."

It was moved by Jack A. Clarke and duly seconded and carried that the resolution be adopted. An amendment was offered by Col. Monroe Johnson, was accepted and carried:

"That our WW II members, in considering their choice of a special commemoration day, be reminded that their birthday on July 14, 1943, and deactivation on July 14, 1946, did not occur haphazardly, but as a part of a broad plan to identify their Division as closely as possible with the first Rainbow Division."

REUNION CORPORATION - President Butts then offered for discussion the tentative plan for setting up a Reunion Corporation which had been published and circulated among the Executive Committee for study and consideration. This plan, in brief, was to set up a Reunion Corporation which would be prepared to take over the holding of a National Reunion on any occasion when the Association failed to receive an invitation from any Chapter; or to assist any Chapter which desired to hold a Reunion, but which felt, (presumptively in the case of a relatively small Chapter,) unwilling to assume the full responsibility for handling a National Reunion. It was the sense of the Committee that such a corporation is not needed by our Association in the foreseeable future.

RAINBOW BROADCASTS - Because of the ever increasing difficulty in obtaining radio time on the Networks, it was moved that this Rainbow activity be discontinued as an annual event.

There being no further business before the meeting, it adjourned at 5 pm.

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DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA - Washington held its top event of the year, the Tri-State Reunion, on February 16th, and it was eminently successful if the expressions of those present are a criterion. More than 75 attended, with National Auxiliary President Rose Barrow heading a distinguished list of out of town Rainbowers. Among these were National Vice President and Mrs. Bob Morrison; National Treasurer Stan Barrow; National Historian and Mrs. George Seaman; Father Duffy Chapter President Jack Tierny, Jim Dent of Roanoke; Earl Dennis, Davey Heller, and Dorothy Schaffer, of Pennsylvania, and many others.

This year's Tri-State Reunion was dedicated to Washington's original Rainbow unit, the 165th Field Hospital. Coming from Albany, New York, was John W. Hart, First Sergeant of the D. C. Field Hospital during its Mexican Border service. Johnny spoke with eloquence and feeling of the Border days. Col. Ivy Pelzman, who served in the D. C. unit as an enlisted man before getting his medical degree and commission, briefly outlined the history of the outfit. Sergeant Tommy Cavanaugh spoke at length of the distinguished service of Major William B. Hudson, the only member of the D. C. outfit to be killed in action.

Messages were read from National President Bill Butts, who had found it impossible to attend, from PNP Manning Marcus, whose health made it impossible for him to be present, and from others.

After the speaking there was singing of a group of songs old enough to separate the men from the boys.

The usual post-banquet Reunion-eering in the rooms of out of towners carried on into the wee small hours.

Chapter President Carl Errickson summed it up thus: "It was a nice party; and - aren't Rainbowers swell people?"

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FLORIDA - The one-and-only Sunshine State saw a sudden spurt in membership, the past few weeks.
