"...to perpetuate that spirit of comradeship which was the greatest single factor in the success of the Division, and to keep alive the memory of our departed comrades..."

These words, included in the preamble to our constitution, define the objectives of the National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans, and throughout the years have been the guidon that we have followed. Inferentially, they ban any question of politics, religion, sectionalism or any controversial subject. Our adherence to the dual purpose they define has made our Association the strong and effective organization that it is today.

Our comradeship, our devotion to each other and to our organization, often referred to as the "Rainbow spirit," makes itself manifest in various ways in various sections of the country and under diverse circumstances. Certain it is that at no time or at no place is the Rainbow spirit more evident than at the annual National Reunion. That is truly "Rainbow at work."

Comrades who soldiered together in France, now located in different sections of the country, meeting in Reunion, often for the first time since the war -- the sacrament of the Champagne Hour -- our memorial service -- truly the Reunion is the exemplification of our aims and purposes, as set forth in the preamble which is reprinted at the head of this article.

It is not too early for Rainbow men and women to look forward to the Reunion in Chicago in July, 1953, and to begin making plans to attend this meeting; which we hope and expect will be one of the greatest in Rainbow history.

Chicago, Host City to the Nation, annually entertains more than ten million vacationists, tourists and convention delegates. It has unmatched hotel facilities, everything in entertainment, and an unexcelled summer climate. It is also the domicile of the Rainbow Chapter which has for years maintained its record of being the largest individual Chapter in paid membership. The advantages of the city, plus the outstanding importance of its Chapter in Rainbow, has prompted the Chicago Reunion Committee to make preparations to entertain at least one thousand Rainbow guests at the 1953 Reunion.

National Reunion Chairman, Sydney C. Anderson, is assisted by two local Chairmen. Mr. Eskil I. Bjork is the Program and Entertainment Chairman and Mr. Frank E. Gould is Chairman of Finance. Each of the local co-chairmen will supervise and monitor the several committees that come under their jurisdiction. Plans in detail are progressing and further announcement will be made in the REVEILLE from time to time. The Chairmen authorize the announcement, at this time, that the Reunion Headquarters will be the beautiful Hotel Sheraton, on Chicago's Magnificent Mile, and accessible to everything of interest to the delegates. Originally planned as a club, the Hotel Sheraton has most unusual facilities for meetings such as ours will be, with abundant beautiful and spacious rooms to accommodate our various sessions and committees.

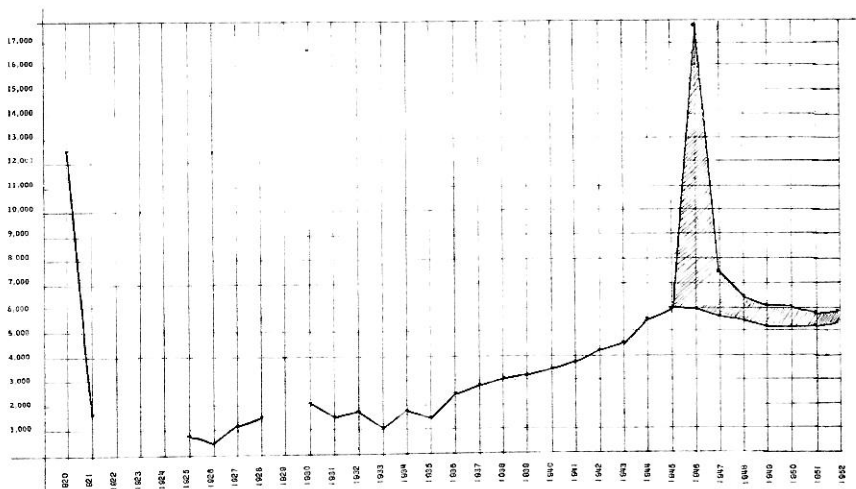

Rainbow Membership Trends Since 1919

Rainbowers who are familiar with the history of our organization have given much thought to a comparison of the membership curve of the Association in the years following World War I with the trend to date of the World War II membership. The chart below portrays a striking similarity between the two categories of membership. The National Association of Rainbow Division Veterans was organized in Germany in 1919 with a membership of 12,571. This dropped to 1670 the following year. Records for the next three years are not available to your Editor as this is written, but the membership stood at 899 in July of 1925, and the following year had dropped to 535. This seemed to have shocked the "wheelhorses" into action, for the next year there were 1200 paid-up members and this rose to 1449 by July, 1928. No records for the next year are at hand, but in 1930 the figure stood at 2087. In 1931 it had again dropped to 1449, went to 1856 in 1932 and once more slumped to 1095 in 1933. From this low it went to 1829, dipped to 1572, and then, in 1936, stood at 2550. From this time the increase was constant, going to 2848, 3050, 3145, 3420, 3752, 4242, 4516, and in 1944 reached 5510. In 1945 membership had reached 6042. The following year World War II men were admitted into the Association and when a membership campaign in the Division brought in 11,778 World War II members, it brought the total membership to 17,791. It will be noted, by referring to the chart below, that the World War I membership stayed at just about the same figure as the year before.

It is at this point that we start comparing the striking similarity between the WW I and WW II postwar membership slump. In the first war the drop was from 12,571 to 1670 during the first year. WW IIers dropped from 11,778 to 1831. As the exact figures from WW I are not before me no exact comparison can be made, but the indicated curve suggested by the chart would infer that the WW II figures of 1174, 1018, 900 and 822 closely parallel the earlier trend. It was 15 years before World War I Rainbowers began the membership

climb that brought them to a high of somewhat over 6000. They have stayed close enough to that figure to suggest that there will not be much recession except as the increasing toll of deaths among the World War I members causes its inevitable attrition.

If the trend of World War II membership were to continue to parallel the World War I figures, it could be assumed that their numbers would remain approximately constant for the next ten or eleven years and would then start a steady climb upward which would continue until a balance were struck between membership recruitment and the Grim Reaper.

But a comparison of the circumstances finds that there are striking differences between the situation of these two groups of Rainbowers, as well as striking similarities.

Some of these circumstances suggest an accelerated growth of membership for WW II, and some suggest less hopeful prospects.

The units of Rainbow I came from specific geographical areas. Take the case of a Company of an Infantry Regiment coming from a city or town in Alabama, Iowa, New York or Ohio. Whether it be the 165th Infantry in New York, or Co. I, 168th, from Clinton, Iowa, it is obvious that the prospects of the men of this Company or Regiment getting together and staying together as a veterans organization are infinitely brighter than if the men composing a Company or Regiment came from scattered sections of the nation. The conditions favored the growth of Rainbow I, and it did grow.

Yet, without these favorable conditions, WW II has apparently shown the same trend of the WW I period in the Association's history. The reason is equally obvious. Rainbowers in 1920 had to "build their house." Nineteen forty-six Rainbowers found a ready-built house, and they moved in. True, it was already occupied, but it was a big house and the occupants were eagerly hospitable. This was the offsetting advantage for WW IIers; a ready-made organization, with funds, a publication, the mechanism for operations established and functioning.

From this it might be supposed that the World War II Rainbower has already received the benefit of an immediate advantage, in its membership growth, while still laboring under the inevitable geographic disadvantage. And actually this is the case. There is one mitigating circumstance, however.

Rainbow Chapters in the great urban centers have found their ranks filled more and more by Rainbowers who have followed the population trend into the big cities. Since this trend will, and does, influence the WW IIer also, it may be assumed that more and more Rainbowers will drift into a comparatively small number of areas. The Chapters in these areas may be expected to grow, and a part of this growth will be among members of the WW II group.

All this is speculative, of course. But membership campaigns, to be successful, must be studied and planned. In so far as these plans can be based upon soundly anticipated trends, they are likely to be more successful.
