A New Rainbow Division

The War Department has announced the creation of a new Rainbow Division. It will be activated at Camp Gruber, Oklahoma, on July 14, 1943. Its personnel will be gathered from all of the States and the District of Columbia, thus resembling the Rainbow Division as it was constituted toward the end of its service. Some time ago the War Department contacted our Association advising that they wished to re-create the Division and asked us if we would give our approval. Accordingly a poll of the Executive Committee was taken and the replies were affirmative by a considerable majority. Your President, therefor, called upon the War Department and advised that the proposal did have our approval and that we would back the new Division and give it our blessing and support. Rainbow Veterans may consider it a distinction that, after an interval of twenty-five years, the name and fame of our beloved Rainbow Division should be considered by the Government a necessary factor in the war effort. All State and Chapter organizations of our Association are asked to support the new Division and give it all the local publicity possible. To the new Division, its officers and men, whoever they may be, go our congratulations and best wishes. May the Rainbow lead you on to fame and glory.

RAINBOW DIVISION VETERANS TO INCORPORATE

The National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans, desires to incorporate due to the fact that same will lend stability and permanence.

The need of incorporation is particularly evident when the development of a "Trust Fund" is considered and the raising of funds to finance a Division Memorial, the latter having been approved by Congress.

The act of incorporation by Congress will perpetuate the memory of the Division in the Federal Code so long as one Rainbow remains to carry on and prestige arising from such an act of Congress is immeasurable.

Following is the Bill which has been introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Fay:

In the House of Representatives

Mr. Fay introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

A BILL

To incorporate the National Association,
Rainbow Division Veterans.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following persons, to wit: General Douglas MacArthur, of Wisconsin; Matthew A. Tinley, of Iowa; George F. Leach, of Minnesota; William J. Donovan, of New York; J. Monroe Johnson, of South Carolina; Fred Crawford, Junior, of Illinois; Howard G. 
of New York; Joseph Justad, of Minnesota; Raymond Ramsey, of Missouri; Edward G. Riekert, of New York; L. J. Roberts, of Colorado; R. F. Radcliffe, of Maryland; Arthur Slattery, of New Jersey; William F. Talbot, of Texas; Edward C. Weitzel, of Ohio; and such persons as may be chosen who are members of "National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans", an unincorporated patriotic society of the veterans of the Rainbow (Forty-second) Division, and their successors, are hereby created and declared to be a body corporate. The name of this corporation shall be "National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans".

Sec. 2. That said persons named in section 1 and such other persons as may be selected from among the membership of National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans, an unincorporated society of the veterans of the Rainbow (Forty-second) Division, are hereby authorized to meet to complete the organization of said corporation by the selection of officers, the adoption of a constitution and bylaws, and to do all other things necessary to carry into effect the provisions of this Act, at which meeting any person duly accredited as a delegate from any local or State chapter of the existing unincorporated organization, known as "National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans", shall be permitted to participate in the proceedings thereof.

Sec. 3. That the purpose of this corporation shall be: To commemorate the best traditions of the citizen-soldier, to foster the spirit of patriotism and loyalty to the Constitution of the United States, to perpetuate that spirit of comradeship which was the greatest single factor in the success of the division, and to keep alive the heroic incidents of our division and preserve the memory of our departed comrades.

Sec. 4. That the corporation created by this Act shall have the following powers: To have perpetual succession with power to sue and be sued in courts of law and equity; to receive, hold, own, use, and dispose of such real estate and personal property as shall be necessary for its corporate purposes; to adopt a corporate seal and alter the same at pleasure; to adopt a constitution, bylaws, and regulations to carry out its purposes,

Denney was captured in Libya by the Germans and Italians before we were in this present war. He was with the British Army as a correspondent and observer at the time he was taken prisoner. He was taken to Italy where he was detained for about five months and then he saw a lot of the Gestapo who "escorted" him to Hitler's Berlin and remained there for some six weeks. The Gestapo had a large quantity of Denney's writings as a correspondent and evidently didn't like some of them but they did him no harm. Denney's ideas on this war are different from a lot of others and we believe he is nearer right than most of them. not inconsistent with the laws of the United States or of any State; to adopt, and have the exclusive right to manufacture and use such emblems and badges as may be deemed necessary in the fulfillment of the purposes of the corporation; to establish and maintain offices for the conduct of its business; to establish State organizations and local chapter organizations; to publish a magazine or other publications, and generally to do any and all such acts and things as may be necessary and proper in carrying into effect the purposes of the corporation.

Sec. 5. That no person shall be a member of this corporation unless he served honorably as an officer or enlisted man in the military service of the United States in a unit of the Rainbow Forty-second Division at some time during the period between August 13, 1917, and May 17, 1919, both dates inclusive.

Sec. 6. That the organization shall be non-political, and, as an organization, shall not promote the candidacy of any person seeking public office.

Sec. 7. That said corporation may acquire any or all of the assets of the existing unincorporated national organization known as "National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans", upon discharging or satisfactorily providing for the payment and discharge of all its liabilities.

Sec. 8. That said corporation and its State and local subdivisions shall have the sole and exclusive right to have and to use in carrying out its purposes the name "National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans".

Sec. 9. That the said corporation shall, on or before the 1st day of January in each year, make and transmit to the Congress a report of its proceedings for the preceding calendar year, including a full and complete report of its receipts and expenditures: Provided, however, That said report shall not be printed as public documents.

Sec. 9½. That as a condition precedent to the exercise of any power or privilege herein granted or conferred, National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans shall file in the office of the Secretary of State of each State the name and post-office address of an authorized agent in such State upon whom legal process or demands against the National Association, Rainbow Division Veterans may be served.

Sec. 10. That the right to repeal, alter, or amend this Act at any time is expressly reserved.

From the Desk of the National Secretary

Since last report six Rainbow states already have reached or passed their individual goals for this, our Silver Anniversary Year. They are in the order of their finish—South Carolina, Pennsylvania, District of Columbia, Illinois, California, and New Jersey—take a peak at the margins, too. Also since March 1, an over-all gain of 8.7 percent in membership is shown, as compared with last year at this time. With but 75 percent of the Rainbow Year gone, the remaining 20 percent of this year's goal of 5,000 can be easily over-subscribed if but 10 percent of the Unattached Rainbowers who regularly receive this Reveille will come thru. Figures don't lie, period.
