

most attractive spot in these United States to any good Rainbower during the Reunion.

He knows, too, that the government has made the request that all unnecessary civilian travel be held down during the existing crowded state of transportation.

This poses a very interesting problem for the Reunion-bent Rainbower. No definite ban on travel has been issued. The country has given to each individual the right to determine for his own part whether or not he will travel. Each man must make his own determination.

No one can decide for you. No one can say "yea" or "nay" to this moot question except you yourself. If an explicit and positive ban were intended, the government has complete power to have effected this. It says, instead, "You be the judge."

We cannot advise you. There are many factors entering into this matter. To begin with, if you have any actual business which you feel it your duty to transact or to offer at the Reunion you are definitely in the clear—there is definitely no intent to estop the functioning of organizations such as Rainbow by any restraint on their business meetings. This will be a streamlined Reunion, as have Rainbow Reunions for the past two years. But it is not even remotely contemplated that there be any interference with the business functions of the Association. Like other veterans' and similar organizations, Rainbow must have its elections and set up its program for the ensuing year. That this program will be one which represents a genuine contribution to the national war effort we have every right and reason to assume.

But how about the man who plans to go to Chicago just for a good time, just because he knows he will enjoy himself.

He has a serious decision to make. It may well be that such a man can legitimately reason that a vacation is needful if he is to carry on without a personal breakdown. There is no doubt that few people are capable of sustaining their efforts at the tempo set by the war without some kind of a break. The federal service has curtailed but not eliminated vacations. If you feel that a break in your work routine will send you back better fitted to carry on with your job, it is right and proper that you take this break. And whether your war "furlough" should include travel to Chicago rather than somewhere else, or rather than staying at home, is a matter for you to decide; the government has left the choice with you.

Whatever you do will be the choice of a thoughtful and patriotic citizen. That's the only kind of men we have in the Rainbow.

Now comes the Rainbow Reunion, July 13, 14 and 15, in Chicago, Illinois, to present a nice problem for the Rainbow Veteran. July, 1944, Reunion Cancelled

On the strong plea of a number of Executive Committee members that the Reunion in July be cancelled because of the war emergency, I submitted the question to the entire Executive Committee which overwhelmingly voted that the Reunion in July be cancelled. Inasmuch as the Committee has such authority in time of war, I have accordingly obeyed its mandate and the Reunion in July is cancelled. The Executive Committee under the Constitution and By-Laws will attend to all problems arising therefrom.

To break tradition in the interest of National Welfare should be a proud boast of Rainbow in face of the personal disappointment which comes to each of us through missing our usual July get-together.

With American troops and our Allies again on the soil of France, Champagne Hour should have a particularly deep significance this year. Gatherings of Rainbow throughout the country will be held on July 14th, in the absence of a National Reunion, and each such gathering, and each Rainbower individually, will observe, as usual, a Champagne Hour at 11:45 p.m. with a special prayer that Providence will see us through to victory.

Rainbow has ever been proud of its observance of the best traditions of service to its country, and in losing its Reunion this July, it is gaining in its self-respect for cooperative patriotism in support of the war effort.

As we approach our wartime, streamlined Reunion in Chicago, I am sure that each of us has given thought to our two Permanent Honorary Presidents—General Douglas MacArthur, United States, and General Henri J. E. Gouraud, France—with whom we served.

On one hand we feel proud and yet on the other sad. We have had the pleasure of having the presence of both of them at our Reunions, but this year we can have only memories of bygone days. It has been many months since there has been any word of General Gouraud. We can only hope and pray that after France is liberated we may again have the extreme pleasure of having him with us or receiving communications from him which we were privileged to enjoy in the past. Until then we can have only the memories of his leadership when we were the only American troops attached to and a part of the Fourth Army under his command.

General MacArthur, under whose command American troops in the Southwest Pacific have been writing immortal pages of victory in the history of our country, fills our hearts

with pride on having served with one of the greatest men in our military history. His inability to span time and distance for a personal attendance, however, will not lessen but strengthen our hopes and prayers for a speedy victory in the Pacific war against Japan.

Let us again join the battle with these two great men—in spirit if not in body. Victory is in the grasp of the United Nations and if we fight shoulder to shoulder with these men on the home front as we did in the front line a few years ago the end of hostilities cannot be far off. The Fifth War Loan is in progress and your full support is essential in keeping the supply lines to our men moving. Give your blood when you can as it may save a life on the front line . . . the life of a man who goes unflinchingly into battle to preserve the American way of life.

As General MacArthur said to us in an address a few years ago:

"I do not know the dignity of their birth, but I do know the glory of their death. They died unquestioning, uncompensated, with faith in their hearts and on their lips the hope that we would go on to victory."

Let's not fail these courageous American youths.

At the meeting delegates were chosen to represent Ohio at the formation of the National Association during which event Col. Hough was elected as National President.

All of which is to remind all Rainbowers they are invited to the Silver Anniversary Reunion in the Deshler-Wallick Hotel, Columbus, on June 9-10. It was in Columbus the first annual reunion was held in 1920. Friday afternoon the free refreshment reunion room will be open and that night a cabaret dance will be held in the Hall of Mirrors of the hotel. Saturday will include business meeting and election, reunion room reunioneing, and the banquet that evening with Ex-Gov. Wilbur Brucker as main speaker. The registration fee is three bucks.
