

inconsistent, as well as some mis-information, I feel that a disclaimer is inappropriate as being much too harsh a judgement, therefore, I choose to use the phrase, "To the best of my knowledge and belief".

As examples of mis-information, it is deemed appropriate to address two items mentioned in the article, relating to Camp Marcus W. Orr, which appeared in the SALZBURGER WOCHEN SPIEGEL:

1. The Americans DID NOT build a prisoner of war camp in Glaserbach in 1945 and certainly not in 1955; the camp had been occupied by an engineer unit of the German Wehrmacht but was converted in 1945 by the Americans for use by the Military Government as a 'detention camp'.

2. Technician fifth class (T/5) Marcus Wayne Orr, who DID NOT fall on Austrian soil, was evacuated to the United States in May 1945, nearly two months prior to his unit's arrival in Salzburg.

At this point, it is considered of greater importance to focus attention on the carefully researched information as follows:

1. The critical dates were Saturday, 31 March, Easter Sunday, 1 April and Monday, 2 April 1945.

2. On these dates, the 42nd Rainbow Infantry Division was concentrating on the assault and capture of Wertheim and Wuerzburg:

- a. the division's main command post reached Klein-Heubach, on the west bank of the Main River, a short distance above (north) of Miltenberg, at 2345, 31 March and left that location at 1400, 2 April 1945;

- b. the assault and capture of Wertheim took place on Easter Sunday, 1 April 1945;

- c. the division's main command post was established at Wertheim from 1500, 2 April to 1510, 3 April 1945;
